MICHIGAN'S NEW GOVERNOR TO BE INAUGURATED NEW YEAR'S DAY

Plans for the inauguration ceremony at Lansing, January 1st, have been completed. The general arrangements are in the hands of a committee of Lansing business men. The oath of office will be administered to Governor-elect Green at noon, Central Standard Time. The ceremony will be held on the east

steps of the Capitol, if the weather permits, otherwise it will be held in the House of Representatives.

Immediately following the inauguration ceremony, a public reception will be held in the Capitol building, which will continue during the afternoon until 4:00 o'clock. The reception will be resumed at the Capitol at 8:00 o'clock in the evening. Music will be furnished during the evening, and provisions will be made for dancing in the corridors of the Capitol.

No invitations are being issued. All meetings are public. Everyone is invited.

The people of Lansing are giving a dinner in honor of the governor and other incoming state officials, which will be held at Hotel Olds. This is being handled entirely by the Lansing committee. As only a limited number of tickets will be available those interested should communicate with Captain W. Foster of Lansing, at once.

MICHIGAN'S FIGHTING ELECTRIC POWER.

The state of Michigan is thriving on a diet of electric power and its ability to consume it looks to be unlimited. During the 12 months ending with November 1st, state used 911 billion more kilowatt-hours than in the corresponding year.

This was the result of D. H. Byerley, of Adrian, president of the Michigan Electric Light Association, following receipt of data in the state's use of power compiled by the U. S. Geological Survey.

Mr. Byerley reported the consumption of electricity for the period covered by the report was 1,391,075,000 kilowatt-hours, compared with 2,937,981,000 for the period ending November, 1925. The gain was 453,034,000 kilowatt-hours, or 15 per cent. Water power of the state produced 713,000,000 below-the-hour which was 75,000,000 more than in the previous year. Yet according to Mr. Byerley, this represented only 28 per cent of the total requirement.

"No one type of service is responsible for the gain," said Mr. Byerley. "More electricity was used in homes, more lines were built to reach towns and villages not previously served, more factories and farms harnessed their machines to motors, more streets and highways were lighted, more advertising signs and store-lighting contributed to merchandising. Many miles of lines were built to serve the rapidly developing resort section."

PONTIAC PUPILS BANK \$68,000.

School officials here are well pleased at the recent showing made by the public schools in the matter of thrifit savings under a system inaugurated here several years ago.

Superintendent James H. Harris announced Thursday, that the High school average per pupil, amounting to 60 cents, was more than double the average rate for the entire country, which he placed at 27 cents.

There was \$68,000 on deposit to the account of the children this week, representing the deposits of 76 per cent of all pupils in the city schools. More than \$1,600 was deposited last week—Pontiac Press.





NEW WAR SPELLS RUIN



Foreign Minister Stresemann, General Secretary, St. Gallen—Landing the League of Nations, which permits representatives of governments to con-
fidentially "man to man" instead of depending on exchanges of cold
written correspondence, Foreign Min-
ister Stresemann of Germany ex-
pressed belief that the World war
would have been averted if the states
men in 1911 had been given the same
opportunities of getting together.

He voiced this view in commenting
on the success of negotiations just con-
cluded here which assured organiza-
tion of a league system of investiga-
tion in place of the international control
of German armaments, to which big
government objected.

"Europe simply cannot stand an-
other war," he said.

MARX MINISTRY IS DEFEATED, RESIGNS

Reichstag Votes Lack of Con-
fidence in Cabinet.

Berlin—Defeated in the Reichstag
in a vote of 251 to 251, the 1913
Chancellor Marx has resigned.

Charges that the ministry
was responsible for the
failure of the government to start
up a defense of the air force
in the conception of a plan to re-
store the fallen hero were raised
in the cabinet's fall.

President von Hindenburg has
asked the chancellor, and has been
given 49 hours to form a new
one, consisting of his party and
the Socialists. He has agreed to do
so, and the new cabinet will be
announced in the early part of the
month.

Establishing a coalition with the
Socialists was the only way the
ministry could be saved, as it
had been unable to find a
majority in the Reichstag.

These negotiations were doomed to
failure, as the Socialists demanded that
certain demands of other right
parties be taken into account.

In the fall there was the strengthen-
ing of Nationalists, both with the
socialist and Communist members.

Nationalist leader Count Von
Weizsaeck declared did not sympathize
with the crudism of the Reichstag
uttered by the Socialists, but was of
the opinion that Germany required

a more stable government, and added
that the Marx administration existed
only for the reason that even some
measures it was able to stand, because
it supported the radicals and on
other policies by a nationalistic backing.

PAY \$96,518,417 TO UNCLE SAM ON DEBT

Eight Foreign Governments
Make Settlement on In-
terest, Principal.

Washington—The United States
treasury has received payments
amounting to \$96,518,417 from eight
foreign governments on account of
their funded indebtedness to this
country.

By far the largest payment was made by England. The total amount
received from Great Britain was \$92,
950,000. Of this amount \$87,930,000
represented interest due on the British
debt to the United States and \$5,000,
000 was applied as a reduction on the
principal amount of the debt.

With the recent installment safely
on the treasury vaults the amount that
Great Britain has paid to the United
States on her war indebtedness was
swelled to \$92,930,000.

In view of the unparalleled strain
that the British industrial force has
had to bear in the troublous years
that have followed the war John Bull's
payment of such a tremendous amount
of money to another nation is regarded
by American economists as an
achievement of the first magnitude.

From Belgium the government re-
ceived the third semiannual payment
of interest on the postarmistice fund
indebtedness of the government to the
United States. The payment, amounting
to \$1,000,000, was made in cash.

Czechoslovakia paid the third semi-
annual installment of principal on her
funded indebtedness. The payment
amounting to \$1,500,000, was made in
cash.

The second semiannual payment on
account of the funded indebtedness of
the government of Estonia was paid
in the sum of \$80,000. The balance will be
reduced in accordance with existing
agreement between Estonia and the
debt settlement agreement.

The eighth semiannual payment of
interest on the funded indebtedness
of the government of Finland was also paid in cash. The total
payment amounted to \$141,043 of which
\$11,115 was interest and \$129,928
was principal.

Finland is making the sixth semiannual
payment of its debt of \$1,000,000 and
the final payment of principal. The
total payment amounted to \$106,295 of
which \$29,226 was interest and \$77,069
was principal.

The fifth semiannual payment of
interest, worth \$100,000, was made
on the long awaited debt of the
government of Poland to the United States.

The amount is \$980,000 which
will be paid in full. The tenth debt
of Poland to the United States will be
settled in accordance with the
existing debt settlement agreement.

Settling the debts of the
Government of Chile, which was
present in the Reichstag, and
of the other countries that
have joined the new cabinet
in Germany.


