The great rush for Northville's pure water is due to the fact that the city water system of Detroit has almost failed to function for days. When water was provided it was so badly loaded with chlorine that few cared to drink it.

Mr. Sank one day sent 37 five-gallon bottles and three big tank trucks running almost constantly to the city. Dozens have driven out from Detroit to secure water at the springs. He stated yesterday that he had no idea when the rush would stop.

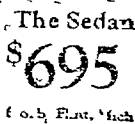

ORDINANCE NO. 71--SEC. 2

(As Amended)

Any vehicle approaching a red light or block, or any device for the control of traffic, which indicates a stop, shall come to a full stop before proceeding to make a turn into another street, and shall become proceeding to pass, such point without making a turn, wait at least six feet back of the crosswalk on said street, until such light, device or block, shall indicate it right to pass.

No driver at such street intersection where a traffic control shall be located shall make a left-hand turn until such time as it can be made with safety to all traffic.

Passed by the Common Council on February 7th 1927.

ORDINANCE NO. 71—SEC. 2

[As Amended]

Any vehicle, approaching a red light, or block or any device for the control of traffic, which indicates a stop, shall come to a full stop before proceeding to make a turn into another street, and shall before proceeding to pass such point without making a turn, wait at least six feet back of the crosswalk on said street until such light device or block shall indicate a right to pass.

No driver at such street intersection, where a traffic control shall be located, shall make a left-hand turn until such time as it can be made with safety to all.

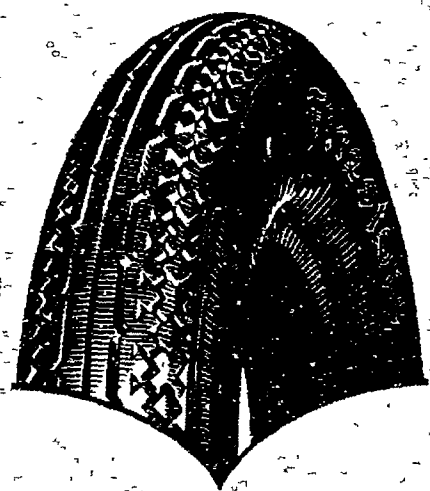

PHONE COMPANY TO SPEND BIG SUM ABOUT NORTHVILLE

Another Toll Cable—to be
Put up at Once Says
Local Manager

Plans for the immediate construction of a second large telephone toll cable between Dearborn and Detroit, carrying circuits to a number of nearby and distant points, have been announced by R. E. Crowe, Michigan Bell Telephone Company manager here. Very heavy increase of the use of the telephone circuits between the outlying towns and Detroit, makes the addition to the interurban telephone toll plant necessary, Mr. Crowe states.

Six years ago the present toll cable was placed from Detroit to Dearborn, and contained 231 pairs of wires. It was expected then that the cable carried sufficient circuits to care for the service needs between Detroit and Dearborn and the cities north and west for several years, but development in the territory has exceeded expectations.

Besides carrying circuits between Dearborn and Detroit, the cable carries the Detroit gateway for long distance telephone service from Howell, Jackson, Romulus, Northville, Plymouth, Wayne and Ypsilanti. During the past year the cable was extended from Dearborn to Ypsilanti and Ann Arbor, Plymouth and intermediate points, and this year will be built to Jackson on its way across the state. Investment in the cable to date totals more than a million dollars.

From the Bell building, at Cass and State streets, Detroit, the new cable will be placed underground in Cass and Michigan avenues to the western village limits of Fordson, from where it will continue aerially. The distance of the cable run is ten and a half miles.

Manager Crowe says, the new toll cable will contain 400 pairs of wires, and that the cost of construction will approximate \$1,500,000. Delivery of the cable, which is being manufactured by the Western Electric plant at Chicago, is expected to begin this month. The new circuit will be in use before the close of the year, it is anticipated.
