





NORTHVILLE MAN FOOLS BANDIT IN GARAGE ROBBERY

Starr Herrick Working in a Place Out on Coast Saves Receipts

Starr Herrick of Northville, who is spending the winter in Los Angeles, California, proved the star in an attempted hold-up of the garage where he is employed out on the Pacific coast.

The Los Angeles Examiner had the following report on the robbery:

"Details of how he outwitted a holdup man Monday night were told to the sheriff's office yesterday by Starr Herrick, night man of the Red Wing garage, at 1909 East Florence avenue."

Herrick said a man entered the garage and asked if he could change a \$100 bill. He refused and after he departed Herrick removed the money from the cash register and hid it according to the report.

"The man later returned with another man and held him up," he declared, "but all the pair secured was \$3 which he had in his pockets."

In a letter to friends here, Herrick says he likes California, but that there are a dozen men seeking every job that is open. "It isn't all that it is cracked up to be, but it is pretty nice at that," he writes.

CRIME QUESTION IS DISCUSSED AT MEETING OF CLUB

**Women Have Interesting
Session—Good Number
are Present**

The Northville Woman's Club met in the library, Friday, February 18th, with a fairly good number of the members present. After the usual order of business, the program scheduled for March 18th, followed as there was some mistake regarding dates.

Mrs. R. J. Gibson, the first speaker on the affirmative, asked that question No. 2, "Should more drastic methods be employed in coping with Michigan's crime wave?" be discussed first. One of the points made was that the prisoners in the penitentiary are treated so well and have so much attention shown them that the possibility of prison life being deterrent to crime and golf courses, there is always the hope of escape or pardon by some lenient governor.

Next came the question, "Is capital punishment the only way of dealing with criminals?"

Mrs. A. H. VanArmen, the speaker on the negative, was followed closely by Mr. H. C. Vrooman, spoke in the affirmative. Her argument was against capital punishment, and she quoted from the Bible to illustrate the vice. So did the first speaker, and a spirited discussion followed. No vote was taken as to the sentiment of the club, but had there been one, the respondents believe the votes would have been split.

The question, "Does the married woman's activity in the business world assist her for a home-maker," was discussed by Mrs. M. H. Sloan and Mrs. J. W. Cleaver, both. All the points on both sides were well-taken, and both speakers acquitted themselves creditably—Mrs. Cleaver speaking entirely extempore. The

almost unanimous verdict of the club was, "It all depends on the woman, whether she has young children and whether she has the consent of her husband to engage in work outside the home."

Club adjourned until February 25th, which will be "Religion and Art Day."

TAKES SPEEDY TRIP IN BUICK IN THE OLD DAYS

Seventeen years ago a Texas editor found news in the fact that a Buick Model 10 traveled a distance of ninety miles at an average speed of eighteen miles an hour. The item read:



NOVI CALLS MASS MEETING TO PLAN FOR DEVELOPMENT To Discuss High School, new Bank and Industrial Prospects

Catching the spirit of development that is headed toward this section, energetic leaders of Novi have called a mass meeting to be held on Thursday evening, March 3rd, to consider many questions of interest.

A letter signed by Ora Harden, chairman of the Novi Chamber of Commerce, Rev. Carlson Thompson, pastor of the Baptist church and Lloyd S. Gullen, secretary of the Consumers Realty company, urging attendance at the meeting, has been mailed to every taxpayer in the township.

Questions to be considered are the establishment of a high school for Novi, the advisability of starting a bank and to discuss methods of bringing to Novi a number of industries that have expressed a desire to locate there.

The meeting will take place at the town hall, and will start at 8:00 o'clock. It is open to the public and those sponsoring it state that all questions presented will be freely discussed.

**MRS. MILLARD DIES;
LIVED FOR 92 YEARS
IN THIS COUNTY**

She Was Mother of Mrs. S. E. Cranston—Burial Takes Place in Plymouth.

Mrs. Caroline Millard, 92 years of age, mother of Mrs. S. E. Cranston of this place, died at her home, 6897 Vinewood Avenue, Detroit, Tuesday morning, following an illness of but a few days. Mrs. Cranston was buried in Detroit last week because of the serious condition of her mother and at that time no active Friends expressed but little hope for her recovery.

Sister of eight, one of the few people in Wayne County who had spent her entire life in this country, she was born out on the Plymouth road near "Buttercup" on Oct. 1. After an marriage she moved to Plymouth a year or two years ago to Detroit to live with her oldest daughter, about fifteen years ago.

DEMONSTRATION OF CORN BORER CONTROL

Corn growers, trapmen, men and others interested, will meet on the G. T. Clegg farm, two miles east of Bettieville on Saturday morning, February 25th, and in the George George room one and one-half miles south of Plymouth, on Tuesday morning, March 1st, to study methods of borer control.

The William Ford Company International Harvester Company, Oliver Chilled Plow Company and the railroads are cooperating with the Com-

borer Station at Monroe and the Wayne County Agricultural Agent in showing the machinery available to clear the corn fields of stalks and stubble.

The field demonstrations will take place in the morning, and in the afternoon a general discussion of the subject by the experts in charge will take place at meetings in Bettieville town hall and in the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce.

William Blair, former well known resident of Northville, died Tuesday morning at his home in Fowlerville, where he had spent the past few years. He was 62 years of age. old buildings still standing. It is the second time I have come out of America because I have been a doctor of ground here. I have about eight patients here and I am still here.



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

**PRESIDENT TYLER
DESCENDANT DIES,
BURIED AT NOVI**

Mrs. Julia A. Bloss, former resident of Northville and a long-time resident of Detroit, a granddaughter of President John Tyler and related to John Quincy Adams, died Monday, February 14th, and was buried Thursday in the family lot at Novi. The funeral was conducted by the ladies of the G. A. R. Before her marriage to Mrs. Bloss, then Julie Bennett, lived there and was employed by the late David Lankham in his button factory. Nearly all of the old residents of Novi knew her well.

She was 91 years old and came to Detroit when a girl from New York State, where she was born. She often told interesting reminiscences of the early days when Indians roamed the state and came to her home for food.

She was the widow of Lewis Bloss, a veteran of the Civil war. They were married in Novi—not many years after the war, lived in Oakland county and in Flint for a time, and later went to North Dakota, where Mr. Bloss died in 1887. She returned to Michigan, coming to Detroit in 1890, where she had since resided. Her nearest surviving relatives in this part of the country, except the children of a half brother and sister, is Mrs. Della Hartman of Detroit, a cousin on the Tyler side of the family.

Mrs. Bloss spent much time several years ago in the Detroit Library, ascertaining the facts relative to her connection with the Tyler family, of which she was pardonably proud. She was past president of Detroit Circle No. 1, of the Ladies of the G. A. R., and a member of several historical societies.





