One of the pleasant surprises of the meeting was the favorable interest shown in the request of the Ladies' Library Association for an appropriation of \$1,499...

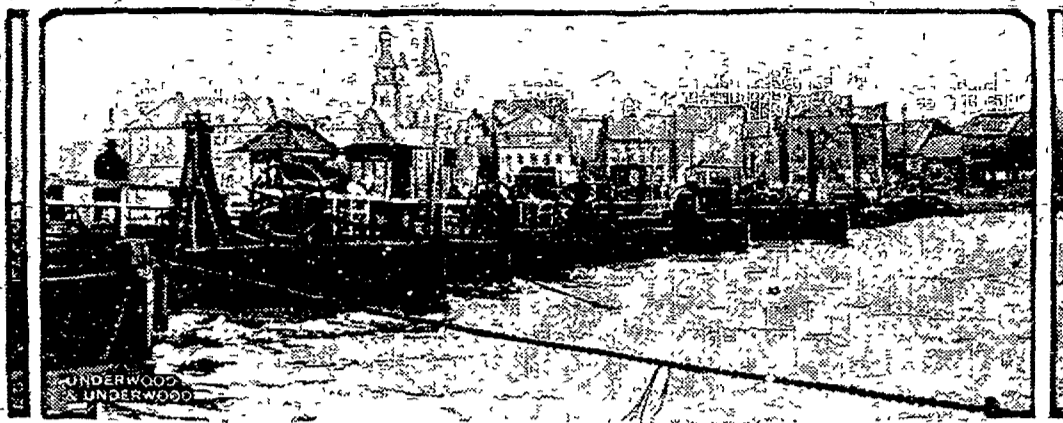
An appropriation of \$2,000 for the support of the library was also made. The township board also voted to take over the operation of the school...

Government Official Urges Establishment of Good Landing Field

USES STICKERS MONTGOMERY IS ELECTION VICTOR

Gets Sixty Votes More Than Needed—How Township Voted

Just plain ordinary stickers—the kind that are used to paste over names on election ballots—what promised to be a featureless election in Northville township Monday.

Joseph Montgomery, who was defeated for re-nomination at the Republican caucus by Leo Lawrence, decided on a come-back, and he came back to the tune of 60 votes to spare.

It was precinct one that enabled him to carry the title of highway commissioner for another year. In precinct two, down under Elliott's grocery store, he broke even, 90 votes for Lawrence and 90 votes for Montgomery.

On the first precinct in the city he walked away with the election, 199 votes being cast for him, while Lawrence received 139. The story of the election is best told in the vote cast for the various questions and candidates.

On the state ticket the results were featureless. The Republican candidates received from 219 to 241 votes each at precinct one and at precinct two the votes ran from 140 to 134. The Democratic candidates received from 33 to 35 at precinct one and from 17 to 19 at precinct two.

There was just one vote cast at precinct two for the Prohibition ticket. One Republican spy, his ticket and gave the Prohibition candidate for superintendent of public instruction a vote.

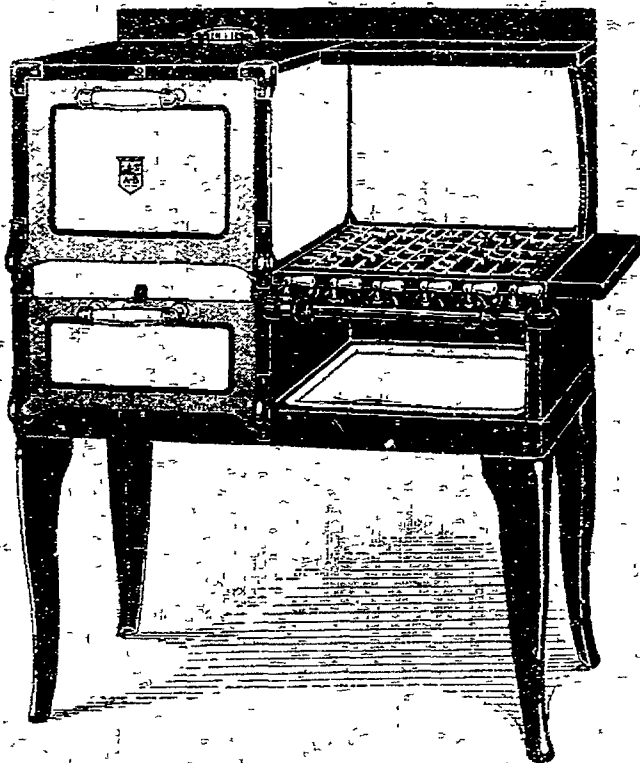

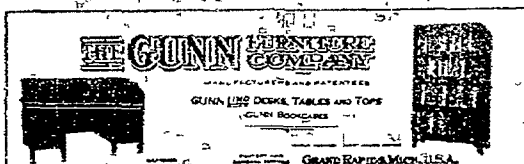

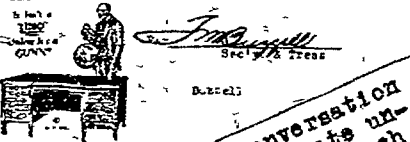

GAS COMPANY IS PLANNING FOR A BIG GROWTH HERE

Representative States That
There Has Already Been
a Big Increase

There is no, the slightest doubt, the minds of the directors of the Federated Utilities Corporation as to the future development of Northville. His statement relative to the growth of Northville bears out the prediction of others who are in a position to know something of what is going to happen in this section. Mr. Deal stated that the use of gas in Northville had increased at a most surprising rate, an exceptional number of new customers having been added to the Northville list during the past few weeks.

COMING HERE TO TRY AND LOCATE ANCESTOR'S GRAVE

Member of State Legislature is Grandson of Pioneer Official

Representative from the State of Michigan, who is a member of the State legislature, will sometime this summer visit Northville and endeavor to locate the grave of his grandfather, who is buried here. Mr. Fish has begun a search of Lansing for many years, where he has served as prosecuting attorney in the county as well as representing the section in the legislature. Recently, he made inquiry about the burial place of his relatives, but failed to locate the place, where he is desired to come here to try and find the burial spot of his ancestor and suitably mark the place.

My grandfather and grandmother came to the vicinity of Northville in 1818. They built a log house over at Salem, where they lived for a time, then they moved to Northville," said Mr. Fish.

"The Detroit News No. 2 will stand by for emergencies, such as rescue flight."

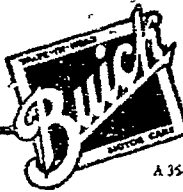



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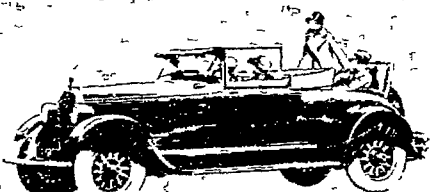
