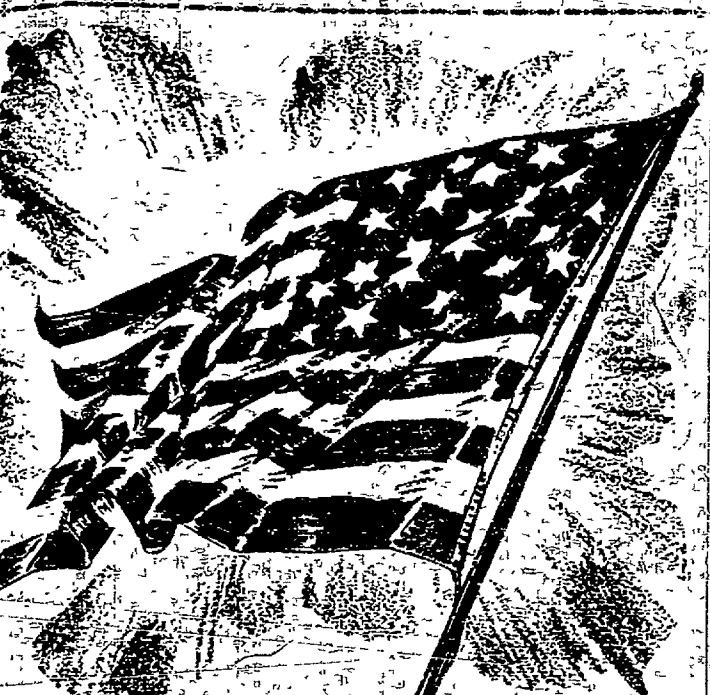


WIN SUCCESS START NOW IS THE ADVICE OF PASTOR
