



BOARD OFFICIAL TELLS GRADUATES WAY TO SUCCESS

Letter Filled with Good Advice Received from E. C. Langfield

"Let your ideals be high, your purpose steady," read a portion of a message from Edward C. Langfield, secretary of the Northville board of education, to members of the Northville high school graduating class, who has been attending the world Rotary convention at Ostend, Belgium.

The letter, teeming with good advice, gained from a successful business career, was read at the commencement exercises. Mr. and Mrs. Langfield are now touring Europe, the Rotary convention in Ostend, having ended a number of days ago. It will be late in the summer before their return to Northville.

Because of the fact that the communication contains so much that is good for anyone to read, it follows in full:

Ostend, Belgium, June 6, 1927.

"Members of the Graduating Class:

"You have come to one of the most important periods in life.

You have arrived at a place where expectations run high and where, not only your parents and teachers, but you yourselves, are inclined to speak of your careers and prospects.

"Let each member of a successful prosperous career. The course of study you have received has been designed to supply you with that nitro-glycerine of the modern world—efficient preparation.

"In this industrial and commercial age, a new type of citizenship is demanded, and an education for a personal participation in that citizenship. Every factor in the community makes for human progress should have a part in that scheme of education and all should be directed toward one end—efficiency.

"The world asks of the graduate, 'What can you do and how well can you do it?' It does not ask him what he can remember about what others have done. It does not seek his average percentage. It does not even question the subject matter he has studied. All it asks is, 'What have you to offer as your contribution to the world's work today?'

"Your places are already waiting for you in the world of men and affairs. The fact that you have successfully completed your courses of study at this school is sufficient evidence that you are competent to fill these positions with credit."

"Today you go out into the world with the confidence that you can face its problems without fear or uncertainty. Let your ideals be high, your purpose steady, and success will crown your efforts. Each one of you has embarked upon a voyage of discovery. Discover what? Your abilities and your devotion to all that is true and good will be your guide. And it must follow as the night the day. Thou cannot then be false to thy man."

"The Board of Education has a personal interest in every member of the class and will follow your careers with genuine solicitude. They stand ready at all times to aid you with their advice and assistance."

"And as you receive your certificates, the proof of your attainment, we bid you hail and God-speed upon your pathway to the goal of success and good citizenship."

SEARCHERS NOT ABLE TO LOCATE BODY OF YOUTH

Hugh Papineau Drowned While Trying to Save Girl in Long Lake

According to information received here, officers have not yet been able to recover the body of Hugh Papineau, a graduate of the Northville high school in the class of 1922 who was drowned in Long Lake, near Orion on Memorial day.

The young lad lost his life in an attempt to save Miss Ruth Woodbeck from drowning. Her body was recovered soon after the accident, but constant search and dragging of the lake has not yet resulted in the location of the body of the young man. He was an expert swimmer but was pulled under the water by the drowning woman.

The two were out in a canoe when it suddenly turned over throwing them both into the lake. Miss Ruth Woodbeck was assistant to the traffic chief of the Michigan Bell Telephone company of Pontiac and the young man had been employed at the Canteen in Clarkston for sometime.

The Flint police, state police and friends have worked almost constantly in an effort to find the body, but without success. The parents of the young man hired the services of Charles Yeager, an expert diver from Detroit, and after searching the bottom of the lake for two days, he was unable to locate the body.

Friends and relatives are now patrolling the lake in the hopes of finding the body. Mr. Leadbetter has charge of the petrol for a number of days past.

It is the plan of the parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Papineau, to hold the funeral from their home in Clarkston when the body is recovered with church services at All Saints church in Detroit and burial at the Holy Cross cemetery in the same city.

While a student in the school here the young man was well liked and his many friends will regret to learn of his untimely death.

Biscuit dough is useful in many ways other than for making hot bread. It has no equal for making fruit shortcake. It can be used for a crust for a meat pie or a fruit cobbler. Sweetened and spiced, with raisins added, it is transferred into tea cakes. Pinwheel buns are made by sprinkling the surface of the rolled out dough with sugar, cinnamon, nuts and raisins, and then rolling it up to be cut across like jelly roll. These pinwheels are sprinkled with more granulated sugar and baked, and are wholesome for lunch or afternoon tea.

A freshly spilled liquid should never be rubbed from a carpet or rug, because this only drives the liquid into the fabric. Instead, cover the liquid with corn meal, talcum powder, blotting paper, corn to bits, or any other absorbent material, which will take it up and prevent its spreading.

When steaming a pudding in a coffee can, the lid must be securely fastened on, but if a small hole is pierced in the top to let the steam escape, there will be less need of tying the lid on and the pudding will not become too moist.




