





OUR MAIL SERVICE

Beginning with January first, Northville residents will be given free mail service direct to their homes. Some time ago the matter was placed before Congressman Grant Hudson by Postmaster Frank Real, and after an investigation of the situation at Northville, the postoffice department decided that the community had grown to such an extent that it was entitled to city delivery service.

The community is grateful to Congressman Hudson and the others who have been instrumental in securing free mail delivery for the city. It will prove a convenience to hundreds of families, and it will also give regular employment to two more men at very good salaries.

Fifteen or six years ago the suggestion that Northville was large enough to have city delivery service would have been laughed at by the most enthusiastic booster in the community. All too rapid has been the growth of Northville, during the past few years that everyone now regards city mail service as something the community is entitled to and should have without any question. The postoffice department will not institute city delivery unless the town is of a certain size and the fact that Northville has grown to a point where in the estimation of postal officials it is large enough for free mail is gratifying evidence of our development.

Wayne County Road Board Has Advised City of Plan for Structure
