CONGRESS FROM WITHIN

A typical "Congress" state paper was the President's Message to Congress on Tuesday, December 4th. It was more positive in its statements than any message President Coolidge has ever sent Congress on its opening session.

Four points stood out. The message emphasized the policy of the present administration as to economic reconstruction, the refunding of public debt, reduction of taxation and the stimulation of industry and trade with a continued surplus for export.

There was disappointment, also, that the message failed to recommend larger appropriations for federal prohibition enforcement. The President did a wise thing, however, in calling to the attention of the nation that the enforcement of the 18th Amendment is usually obligatory on the state government as it is on the federal government.

House bill substituted for the Senate bill. The commission appointed by the president to make further surveys for the project during the summer has recommended Black Canyon 18 miles below Boulder Canyon as the better site for the construction. This report may be used by the opposition to delay action.

More assured is the passage of the Navy Construction bill, which passed the House in the last session, calling for the replacement of 17 obsolete vessels. This bill is in no ways an expansion program bill, but one of replacement.

Extra sessions are said to be a natural development in a new administration. Campaign promises with regard to the tariff revision moved, President Taft to call one immediately after his election. President Wilson also called one when he took office, but that was done as a war measure. The present situation is similar to that of 1908 when campaign sentiment was responsible.

DISCUSS PLANS TO MAKE MILFORD FAIR COUNTY ONE

Board Has Under Advice the Deeding of Land to County

An article of more than ordinary interest to the many who have backed the Northville Wayne County fair appeared in the last issue of the Milford Times. The fair board of that place is considering turning the operation and management of the fair over to Oakland county.

The article says: "The annual meeting of the members of the Oakland County Fair association held at the Exchange Club rooms, Tuesday afternoon, heard the yearly reports of the association's secretary and treasurer, voted to hold a fair during the second week in August, 1929, and elected the regular quota of directors. The reports had, previously, been passed upon by the finance committee and were accepted by the members."

Joe Pittenger, Clyde Shurtz and W. R. Gamble were appointed tel-

ers and clerk, and the following were elected as directors: F. R. Sleeth, E. S. DeGarmo, W. S. Lovejoy, Clyde Shurtz, S. J. McCall, W. S. Rose and Earl Rogers.

The meeting adjourned and was immediately followed by a meeting of the directors, in which S. J. McCall, W. S. Lovejoy and Walter Palmer were re-elected president, secretary and treasurer, respectively. F. R. Sleeth was chosen as vice president.

The plan of deeding the association grounds to the county which was favorably considered by the fair board some time ago, again came up for discussion. The supervisors on the fair board, with the fair officers, were named a committee to devise a procedure by which this could be done and report their findings at a meeting of the fair directors in January.

When a plan is approved by the fair directors it will be submitted to the board of supervisors for action. Many plan, agreed upon will include the provision that the county will hold title to the grounds and that the County Fair association will be given a lease of the grounds—probably for 30 years—for fair purposes.

Failure and Success Mixed in Blackstone

Blackstone was born in 1723. There are said to be three ways by which a young man can get on in the big world: by marrying an attorney's daughter, by writing a book or by a miracle. Blackstone wrote a book.

He was a more or less distinguished barrister, and like many other (successful) failures set out to learn others how to succeed in the profession at which, to put it mildly, he had not got so many laurels himself. The oil came of his Oxford lectures, which, as a humorous law book ever printed, he wrote it with a little of part always on his desk.

His work is rather spotted at today, as a textbook for professional students, but its rare and lucid style made it the authority to which, for nearly two centuries, every lawyer has turned. When the newly formed United States first set up court of their own, they took "Blackstone" as their legal bible.

The author, became an M. P. and a judge. It was his dictum, during the trial of a woman murderer, that gave rise to one of Doctor Johnson's most entertaining discussions, about the man who shot himself, "because he could not do better but himself, and he says: 'I have said from the front of the London Daily Mail."

WHERE TO GET CHRISTMAS SEALS



Mrs. M. Brock of West Main street, is local chairman for the Woman's Club of Northville, in charge of the tuberculosis Christmas seal sale for the benefit of the Detroit Tuberculosis sanatorium.

Each year the Christmas seal sale is conducted under the auspices of the National Tuberculosis association, which assigns to some one agency for tuberculosis prevention and cure the proceeds from the local sale.

The Detroit Tuberculosis sanatorium, which receives its only revenue from the sale of Christmas seals, is located at Tuxedo avenue and Tenth street in Detroit. It is a beautiful building, and the food served is also maintained as a unit of the sanatorium, where patients, discharged from the sanatorium, may have their other convalescence, so necessary to prevent a relapse. In all the two units provide accommodations for 265 patients.

Mrs. H. J. Maxwell of this city is general chairman of the sale in Detroit, where seals are being sold in theatres, hotels, postoffice, department stores, office buildings and other centers. Mrs. L. E. Schultz is chairman of the sale in Wayne County.

The main object in using a refrigerator is to save food, not ice, so real economy of operation consists in having well-insulated walls, in keeping the ice-chamber well stocked in opening doors only when necessary and for as brief periods as possible, in putting nothing into the refrigerator that does not need to be kept there. For example, paper wrappings on meats and other foods, vegetables and fruits that can be stored equally well in a vegetable bin or closet, or extra dishes containing leftovers that could be combined on one plate should not be put in the refrigerator.

GOVERNORS OF MICHIGAN

Governor of Michigan for three successive terms was the record of Fred M. Warner. No other governor of the state ever for thousands of dollars. This agitated that distinction. But that was not all. Fred M. Warner was the only foreign born governor Michigan ever had. He was born in Hicking, Nottinghamshire, England, July 21, 1855. His parents came to this country when he was but three months old. It was only a short time later that his mother died. (Hon. F. D. Warner of Farmington, Michigan, adopted the boy when only 14 years old, he graduated from the Farmington high school. He attended the Michigan Agricultural College for one term, returning to Farmington to become a clerk in his father's store. He displayed business ability and the store was soon turned over to him.

In 1888 he established a cheese factory, and later started others about the state. There were five big cheese factories in Michigan that were operated by the former governor at one time.

He was twice elected to the state senate from his district and bore the distinction at one time of being the youngest member of the state senate. He served nearly a score of years as a member of the village of Farmington, and was seven times elected president of the village.

In 1900 he was elected secretary of state and held that office for four years. He was also the youngest secretary of state Michigan ever had.

In 1904 he was nominated for governor and served three terms. Governor Warner, always interested in farm products, established a binder twine factory in Jackson prison, forced down the prices on this product, and saved the farmers of Michigan hundreds of thousands of dollars. His effort to induce the legislature to establish a binder twine factory was bitterly opposed. So beneficial did Michigan ever had. 





TRY A 25c LINER IN THE RECORD?

FOUNDED POLICE OFFICER LIVED HERE YEARS AGO

Ray Haddock Victim of a Joint Keeper's Bullet

Ray Haddock, former Northville boy now a sergeant on the Detroit force, was shot while raiding a booze joint in Detroit, a few days ago. Fortunately, however, the wound received is not a dangerous one. Haddock is always one of the officers at the local fair each year. The following article in one of the Detroit newspapers gives the details of the shooting:

"A police sergeant was shot and a patrolman was injured in a fall when the police early today raided a large underground still beneath the home of Albert Gorga, 2415 Hawthorne avenue. Sgt. Ray Haddock of the Palmer Park Sta-

tion was wounded by Mrs. Ida Gorga, the wife, when he attempted to gain entrance into the house through an upstairs window. Patrolman Anthony Schultz suffered a fractured ankle when he fell off a ladder while following Haddock. Gorga and his wife, both 28 years old, are held at the police headquarters on charges of assault with intent to kill.

In a large concrete room, extending underground from the house to the garage and guarded by secret floors the police found a 1,000-gallon still in operation and 78 barrels of mash cooking. At 1:45 a. m. Patrolman Schultz, while walking his beat in Hawthorne avenue noticed the smell of cooking mash coming from the Gorga home, he said. He notified Sergeants Haddock and Albert McLeod, and the three policemen all in uniform went to the home. Haddock said that he had kicked at the door several times and all the lights in the house immediately were turned out.

Haddock said that there was no one in the house when he went to the knocking, so he kicked a door and placed it against a balcony leading to a second story. Sergeant Haddock said he climbed up to the window, which was open. As he entered the room he saw the mash being returned on a table. Gorga and wife, both armed, fired several shots at the officer. Haddock was wounded in the right leg by the woman, he said.

He backed out of the room upon the balcony after firing one shot at the floor. He said. Patrolman Schultz returned to the second story. Haddock, who had been shot, was carried over the balcony to the street. The officers then sent for a patrolman from the Central and Palmer Park stations, led by Lt. J. J. Facer, responded and then he was refused entrance into the house. The police shot Gorga and his wife still holding their revolvers. The police saw the man and placed under arrest.

A search of the house disclosed three barrels of wine in the basement. In the garage the police found a hidden trap door that led into a hole measuring several feet under ground at the end of the driveway. A concrete-lined compartment divided into two rooms, the cooking area was in one room and the still was operating in the other. At the far end of the enclosure a low passage way led through a concealed door into the basement of the house. The entire compartment was about 30 feet long by 25 feet wide.

When questioned at the Palmer Park station, Gorga and his wife said they believed the police high wire act. They received a letter from the Detroit office on December 11, 1928, and they were told that if they did not get down to the bottom of the matter they would not be permitted to see their boy who had been through the shooting and was in the hospital. When the police attempted to question him, his only reply was, "I don't know anything."

Gorga came to Detroit from Italy six years ago and has taken out his first citizenship papers. The police say they may ask for his deportation if an investigation warrants the action.

PEDESTRIAN HAS STREET RIGHTS SAYS HIGH COURT

Auto Drivers Must Always Look Out for Person Walking

A Court decision of prime importance to all motorists and of interest to Northville residents, has just been handed down by the District Court of Appeals, upholding a pedestrian's right of way at a crossing, despite the fact that signal shifts according to the legal department of the American Motorists' Association.

In the effect, the court holds the pedestrians have the right of way not only at uncontrolled crossings, but also when they have entered an intersection on a green light and further holds that the pedestrian has the right of way until he reaches the opposite curb, without regard to the change of lights during his passage of the crossing.

The decision is regarded by the association's legal department as just and is being called to the attention of the motoring public in order that the motorists may have full knowledge of his legal responsibility.

A BIT OF DEER NONSENSE

So many conflicting stories have developed about that deer that Nelson Schrader shot up north, that there are strong possibilities of a post-mortem being held to find out just whether it was blind and hard of hearing.

Nelson declares the critter was in perfect health, that it would hear and see.

Don Stewart and Dayton Bunn are just as emphatic in declaring that it was sane and blind, and that it couldn't even hear.

Now comes additional testimony from Scott Lovell that he isn't quite so sure that it was perfectly normal in every way.

Scott has recalled that he was shooting at a mark and that he thought he saw a deer that never moved when his rifle was discharged.

"It was early in the morning, I was doing a little target practice before going out on my daily tramp through the woods for exercise. (No, not hunting) I looked through the brush and there stood what I thought was a deer. I blazed away at my target and the thing didn't move. I kept firing and still it never moved. Then I was so sure it was a deer I went after it. Nelson Schrader came in from where I thought I saw the deer and he said he had shot a big one. We all ran out there and sure enough it was dead, just where I thought I had seen a deer. I didn't know when I shot it. So for that reason, I believe I will have difficulty that the deer was pretty dead when it wasn't totally so," said Scott when questioned by the reporter.

With comes the expert William Safford. William is a witness for the perfect deer. He declares it could see that it could hear, and it was not paralyzed. William will be a witness at the request for Nelson.

Bunn and Stewart have called in Doc Alexander. Doc says the death of the deer that he saw would indicate that it was blind. Mr. Schrader contends that the teeth of a deer have nothing to do with its eyesight. He does say, however, that it wouldn't surprise him if it bit any deer that ever strolled across Doc's pathway would be blind.

So far Ed Perrin, Carl Ely and some of the other legal experts have not been summoned to give testimony. It is not expected that the technical witnesses will be called upon until all the hearsay evidence has been disposed of.

Dayton Bunn wants to have the eyes of the deer tested out by some eye doctor he knows over in Toad Hollow. Dayt will never admit that the deer was anything but blind.

"How would it have ever run into a bullet fired from Schrader's gun if it hadn't been blind?" he asks.

There has been some substantial testimony offered that the deer was paralytic and could not see.

Doc Cavell is inclined to be on the Schrader side of the controversy, but he thinks John Walker and Harry German should be heard in the matter.

Charlie Hamilton heard about the affair and when he came to town this week from over in the hills of Nova Scotia he wanted to know something about how the fellow expected to prove anything.

"Nobody knows where Nelson put the deer's head. He might have left it up north. Of course, we've got to have the corpus delicti before we can prove anything. I think in special of the great deer hunting fraternity of this section we should have this matter cleared up," said Charlie.

That has put a new angle on the case. Some of the hunters didn't know just what Charlie meant by corpus delicti and some thought they had better go and consult either Ex-Judge Perrin or Judge Ely. But they didn't know. Others thought that the post-mortem ought to be held first.

A meeting was held the other night over in the back end of Ward's hardware. Some of the more conservative ones think that the matter just be dropped but Bunn insists that the old deer was blind and of course that makes Nelson piping hot and from latest reports it looks very much as though it is going to be a cold winter.

Need An Examination?



Young people between the ages of 14 and 19 are the objects of special attention at the free chest clinics of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association. Statistics show that tuberculosis is still the chief killer in this age group in Michigan, although the "White Plague" has been driven from first down to fourth place as a cause of death for all ages.

Chest clinics, supported by funds raised in the sale of penny Christmas seals, were conducted by the Michigan Tuberculosis Association last year in 41 counties. Of the 1311 patients examined at these clinics, 207 were found to have active cases of tuberculosis and 328 were diagnosed as suspicious cases.

Motor folk are putting on a used car week. We had thought that every minute of the year was used car week as it is in Los Angeles.

When a sweater is to be washed, it should first be measured carefully so that after washing it can be stretched to its original size and shape. Use lukewarm water and only neutral soaps. Strong washing powders should not be used but borax and ammonia are safe to add to water included to be hard. Use any soap in the form of a jelly and do not rub soap directly on the fabric. Use more water for any wool garments in proportion to bulk than for any other fabric. Squeeze and work the sweater in the suds without rubbing. Press out excess water and wash in a second suds of the same temperature. Rinse free from soap in several changes of lukewarm water of about the same temperature as was used before. Wring through a loose-net wringer. Dry in a warm place but not near a fire or in the direct sunlight. Never allow a sweater or any other wool garment to freeze. Spread the sweater out, back down, with sleeves out-stretched, on several thicknesses of clean soft material laid flat. Measure and shape according to the dimensions previously taken. If necessary pin in place. Turn occasionally after it is about dry.

TWO MAYORS OF NEW CITY WILL OPPOSE EACH OTHER AT SPECIAL ELECTION

The special election to be held January 9th in the newly created city of Fordson, Mayor Clyde M. Ford of Dearborn, and Mayor Floyd

E. Yinger of Fordson, will oppose each other for the chief executive of the consolidated city of Dearborn. Yinger's primary election showed last night James P.
