

Timely Tips For
Northville Gardeners

Plan to do a little weeding each week at the same time the lawn is being mowed. A weedless lawn can only be achieved through great effort.

Never let vigilance relax in regard to aphids after spray. Immediately upon detecting a few of the insects at work. Remember that they usually congregate on the under side of the leaves so direct your spray accordingly.

Before the growth advances further, prune all plants as well as trimmed during the dormant or pre-growth season. It is better to prune late than never.

Iris plants may be transplanted with great success when they are through blooming. The leaves should be cut back within six inches of the ground. While the location or different colors is fresh in your mind, it is a good time to move them about or perhaps give them a needed dividing.

Don't forget the goldfish to keep mosquitoes from colonizing in the pool.

Plant everything that is still to be planted as soon as possible. This means evergreens, shrubs, perennials, annuals and summer bulbs.

Make an herb garden if is not too late to get the plants now sow the seed. Every home planter ought to possess at least a dozen of the culinary and medicinal herbs.

The seeds of both hardy and half hardy annuals may be sown now directly in the open ground to produce plants for summer flowering.

Make a fertile seed bed and plant in narrow rows.

Western Scenic Beauty

Neglected by Writers

Those "great open spaces" are admired by everyone, but few can write about them in words of grandeur. Stewart Edward White was one—and John Burroughs was another. Willa Cather in her "Death Comes to the Archbishop" painted us some pictures of the wastes of the Southwest; and was particularly enamored of the topographical phenomenon called the mesas.

Melville and Ruskin ought to have seen our noble western plains. They were as inspiring, worthy of great prose, richer more intrinsically than poetry. Scraps, such as this, may disregard rhyme, though by Coleridge or Shelley himself. Poetry can sometimes be restricted by the flights of fancy. One is compelled by its strict rules to overshoot or fall short. It is often a pleasant falldown but a falldown nevertheless.

Some of Ruskin's descriptions of the scenes of nature are as majestic as the Bible in diction, a book he almost knew by heart, which reminds us that one of the signal tributes paid to the Great Canyon—feature of the great open spaces we speak of, was that of an eastern writer who said it recited in a cited sentence: "We still and know that I am God."

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



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

Northville long famous as a place for crack clay pigeon shooting, is again the home of a gun club. Recently several of the old-timers got together and decided that the gun club should be reorganized. TO SOFTEN HARD WATER
Millions of millions of gallons of water are used daily in the country for temporary or permanent. Temporary hardness is due chiefly to the presence of magnesium limestone held in solution as carbon dioxide and can be removed by merely heating the water or it can be reduced by adding small quantities of lime. It is followed by softening and precipitation.

Permanent hardness is due to dissolved calcium sulphate and can be reduced by boiling the water or by adding chemicals to it. The most common method is to add acid to the water. It is best to use a strong sulfuric acid.






GAY YOUNGSTERS DO SOME CAMPING IN JOY STRUT



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
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WOMEN PROVIDE FUNDS TO CARE FOR CEMETERY

To provide music for the occasion Mr. Henry Ford's old time orchestra was present during the serving of the dinner. Mr. Ford has been of aid before to this group of women. It was through his generosity that water was pumped into the mains in the cemetery sometime ago.


The Clarenceville cemetery is on the Base Line. Some ten of a dozen years ago the ladies of that little community formed an association which they called the "Busy Workers" in order to take care of the old cemetery which at that time was not in very presentable condition. Later this same group incorporated was the "Clarenceville Cemetery Association" and it is this association that sponsored the dinner.

The women have kept the cemetery up in nice shape and they are proud of their accomplishments!

The cemetery is one of the oldest in this section having been purchased on April 15, 1841 by Samuel Sabins for \$4000. All of the money raised from the few pioneer farmers living in that locality for a burial ground.

There were 91 lots and 50 sold for \$120 per acre. In the early days a DeKaz home was gone to the center.
