## Famous Bell, Silent For Ninety-six Years May Ring Out on Washington's Birthday

The famous old Liberty Bell, which so joyfully rang to announce the Declaration of Independence and which tolled so sadly when George Washington died at Mount Vernon, may again ring forth from Independence Hall in Philadelphia, on Washington's next birthday, February 22, 1931.

The Light Beagles' class of George Washington Sunday School held their annual meeting and party Saturday afternoon in the Ralph Wilson Lodge, 211 Main St., in Northville, honoring the third day of the month, a bushful of 111 years of age, and joined 21 years were spent
