Harold Wayne Hubbard

After an illness of only seven days with pneumonia, Harold W. Hubbard, 304 S. Center street, died at the University hospital, Ann Arbor, last Monday, February 1, at the age of 25 years. Mr. Hubbard was taken suddenly ill at his home and was hurried to the hospital where, in spite of excellent care, he succumbed to this fatal malady.

Mr. Hubbard was born in Detroit November 7, 1896. For several years he was employed in the local Ford factory where one year ago he suffered an accident in the loss of one eye.

The funeral was held yesterday (Thursday) afternoon in the Schrader funeral parlors with Rev. W. R. Barbour officiating. The remains were placed temporarily in the mausoleum in Rural Hill.

George Cappell, for many years a resident of Northville, died in Asheville, N. C., on January 26. The remains were brought back to Northville for burial, the funeral being held at the Schrader funeral parlors Saturday afternoon, January 30, with Rev. W. R. Barbour officiating.

Ella Ward and to them were born three sons, Carlton and Will of Asheville and Arch of Duluth, Minn., all of whom survive. 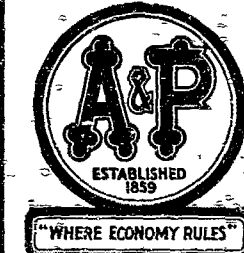

HOMEMAKER'S CORNER

BY MRS. EDITOR

WHY BOYS GO WRONG

It is a fair guess that there is not a mother of boys in Northville whose heart has not quaked when the story of the mistakes of two of our local boys was made known. We hesitate to call it "crime" for we mothers of boys, if we are fair minded, must admit that growing boys are a problem. Let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall. Each of us charitably asks, "What if it had been my boy? Am I doing all that I can to prevent my boy from taking the first step toward being a criminal?"

Now is the time for serious heart searching. Whose fault is it that boys go wrong? Let's consider some startling statements made by that great boy authority, Judge Ben Lindsey, judge of the juvenile court of Denver, Col.: "The majority of boys go wrong because their parents do not know them. Even for his serious faults I could never frame an indictment against this American boy, but these might well be an indictment against careless fathers and mothers. They are too busy to become his friends so he soon develops a secret life which is filled with corruption. Fathers could well profit by less business and better boys. What, it seems to me we should look for most carefully in boys is not the faults of boyhood, carelessness, recklessness, noise, but his larger qualities which may be developed, the vital qualities, which go to make up wholesome boyhood, an unfailing respect for his elders, which means obedience; truthfulness, kindness, and the purest thoughts toward every girl he plays with or meets. The best hope I can have for every American boy is that he will have a hard time rather than a good time, infinite difficulties rather than ease, for without these there can never come that genuine joy, success and happiness which is bound to come to the man who does not shrink."

Another man, John L. Whitman, who has handled over 24,000 boys-cases, as jailer of the Cook County jail, Chicago, says: "All boys should be carefully watched. No boy is too good to be watched-not because he is an object of suspicion but because he has not the judgment of a man. Thousands of boys go wrong."

because parents take it for granted that a good home is a guarantee of good conduct. Parents should keep in touch with a boy's associates. Another important thing which parents can do to protect boys from going wrong is to teach them not to yield to impulse, to stop short and do a little steady thinking when the first suggestion of impulse, cat's paw, comes. Boys are immature; they lack balance.

The arbitrary, austere and unfriendly atmosphere of homes is responsible for much of the misconduct of boys. Such an atmosphere is almost as fatal to the moral nature of a boy as too much laxity.

In conclusion, keep your boy busy and interested in something. It may be something which amounts to nothing in itself and from your viewpoint, but if it really interests and occupies him it is vitally useful and important. Do not let him have any time in which he "doesn't know what to do." Provide him with a ready and warning outlet for every ounce of "steam" that is in him. To get the best results this outlet must be one that is agreeable to him; and let every day find him soundly and wholesomely tired-ready to drop into restful slumber the minute he goes to bed.

In this important problem we have another authority well worth quoting but our space in this corner is limited. More next week.
