The moratorium plan to open the Northville banks provides for the separate opening of the two, with a merger afterward: Now the news comes from the state-banking department at Lansing that if sufflicient progress is made in securing signers to the depositors' agreements, it may be possible not to wait for the banks to open separately-and later-merge, but to combine in the near future This would be a splendid thing for the community, it is generally agreed.
