plenty of pluck. He has invested in plant and equipment after many years of hard grueling work fifteen thousand dollars in good hard money.

His paper is well printed, well set, well edited. The business men of that town expect the publisher to keep on spending money for the living expenses of himself and family with them as well as his employees.

This same situation applies to a majority of the smaller towns and cities. Then you hear business men whining about the times and conditions. A strong pull altogether would mean so much to all concerned. The situation is disgraceful to say the least.

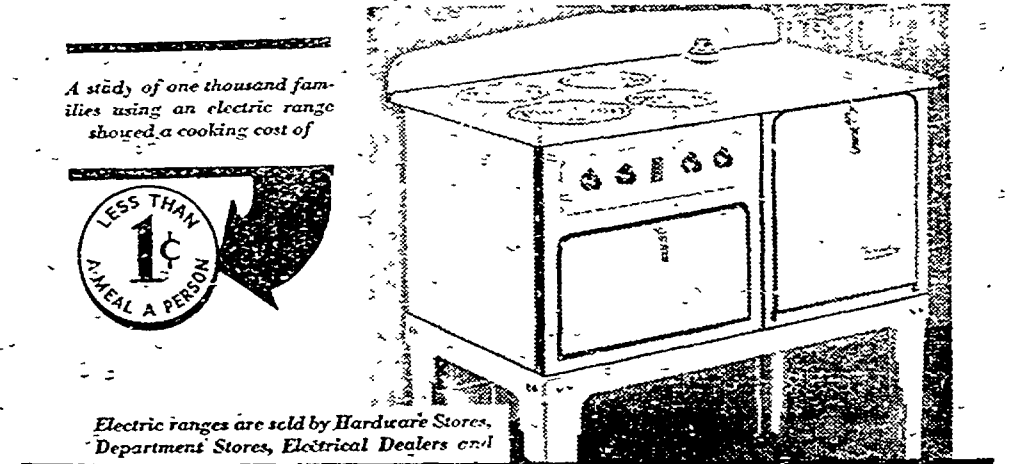

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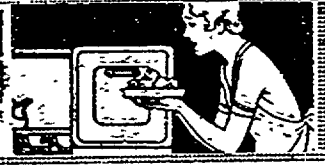
