VANDENBERG DID IT

(The Detroit News, July 29) In his zeal for defending the Roosevelt administration, Frank Murphy, candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor, was careless with facts in a recent Detroit speech. Listing acts which he said started the United States on the way to recovery, Murphy said the president "butressed the banks with the plan of insuring deposits."

The truth is that Senator Vandenberg in the spring of 1933 was the sole author of the amendment providing a guaranty of all bank deposits up to \$2,500 which became a part of the Glass banking bill. This was the culmination of a fight which Vandenberg had waged in the senate since the spring of 1932.

The bill became hopelessly deadlocked in the senate because of differences of opinion among leading senators. President Roosevelt assumed no leadership in the matter. Rep. Henry B. Steagall, chairman of the House Banking Committee, proposed an amendment to guarantee all bank deposits and this was adopted by the house but was opposed by President Roosevelt.

Thereupon Senator Vandenberg began a serious campaign to arrive at a compromise. He consulted with Senators Glass, McAdoo and Fletcher and finally gained approval of the plan to guarantee all bank deposits to the limit of \$2,500. Conferees were held at the White House and cooperation of the administration was enlisted. But during the greater part of the earlier discussions, the president took no position for or against the proposed measures.

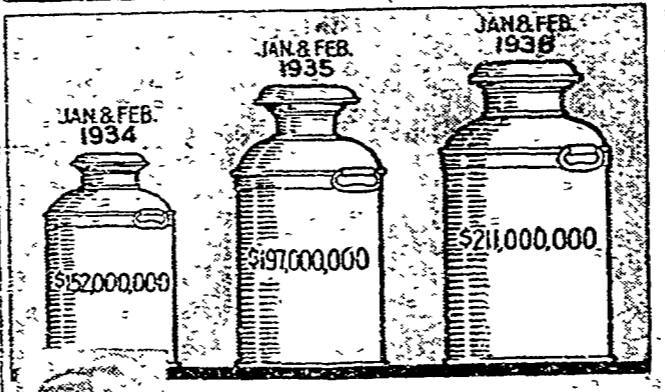

Milk Best Source of Farm Cash—Survey Indicates Steady Increase



MILK as the largest single source of farm income put around \$211,000,000 in farmers' pockets during January and February despite the severe storms, according to H. C. Hansen, Lansing dairy leader, who said that preliminary government figures show dairy returns to be the highest since the low of 1932.

"While the storms and floods this year have cost farmers and distributors thousands of dollars in heavy extra expenses to get milk to consumers," said Mr. Hansen, "the farmers increased total milk income is gratifying despite the heavy losses."

"Ten years ago milk was less than 15 per cent of total farm income in this country," he said, "while the 1935 figures indicate milk to be about one-fifth of the total. The increase means that farmers are getting about \$300,000,000 more out of milk than they received in 1932. Milk is also the best source of farm cash in most cases as it is paid for monthly. With most crop payments not made until the end of the season."

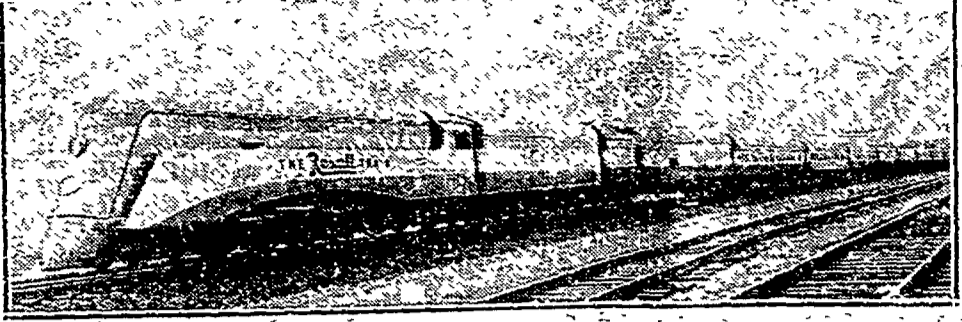
