VILLAGERS PRESENT 'MESSIAH' SUNDAY TO LARGE AUDIENCE

Methodist, Baptist Pastors Assist with Ceremony; 68 Voices in Chorus

For the fourth consecutive year, villagers heard Leslie G. Lee's chorus of 75 voices sing Handel's immortal "Messiah" Sunday evening in the Presbyterian church.

Preceding the presentation, the audience joined in the singing of Christmas hymns and carols. Two of the local ministers participated in the service, the Rev. Harry J. Lord of the Methodist church, reading the scripture lesson and offering prayer, and the Rev. Kendall S. North of the Baptist church, giving a brief history of the "Messiah."

Mr. North told of the first singing of the "Messiah" in Dublin, Ireland, April 13, 1742. He referred to the custom started in England in March 23, 1749, when the audience led by the king, rose to their feet and remained standing during the Halle-lujah chorus.

Rev. Thomas W. Smith, New Presbyterian Minister, Preaches Here Sunday

The Rev. Thomas W. Smith spoke Sunday morning from the pulpit of the First Presbyterian church on the first time since accepting a call to the pastorate of the local church. He succeeds the Rev. H. G. Whitfield who takes Mr. Smith's former charge at Hibbing, Minn.

A Christmas theme, "No Room for Them in the Inn," was developed by Dr. Smith as he told his new congregation of the popularity which has been given in recent years to the accessories of this season.

"We make no room for Christ. He is crowded out, despite the joy we have in our hearts for Christmas festivities. We all have a nice opinion of Jesus, but our sorrows and troubles are largely due to the fact that we do not obey. Worship is no obedience; praise is not cross bearing. If Jesus were not crowded out of the business world so much, there would be fairer wages and the spirit of brotherhood would bring peace to all lines of industry," stressed Dr. Smith.

In an interlude the forepart of the week, Mr. Smith spoke of the village as a lovely place in which to live. There are so many fine people here, Mrs. Smith and I are not looking at Northville as an easy street. We both realize how much work will be required to carry on our tasks in the church," he said.

1936 FAIR FUNDS SHOW BIG INCREASE

Name Stark and Scholtz to Fill Vacancies on Board of Directors

D. J. Stark replaces the late Nelson C. Schrader and Charles Scholtz succeeds the late T. C. Richardson on the Northville Wayne County Fair board. In accordance with action taken Friday evening when the board held its first meeting since tabulations have been made on the financial outcome of the August Fair.

C. A. Altman, A. C. Balden, Carman Benton, H. E. Clark, Ralph Foreman, William E. Forney, A. E. Fuller, H. H. Hamilton, Glenn Richardson, H. R. Richardson, Harry C. Robinson, M. R. Seegle, L. C. Stewart and E. M. Starkweather were re-elected to the board of directors. Heading this group are Elton E. Eaton, vice president; Floyd A. Northrop, secretary; and Fred W. Lyke, treasurer.

The 1936 Fair was a financial improvement over last year's, commented Mr. Northrop this week. "We were able to pay more on the mortgage, meet more debts and have more left in the bank this year than has been the case for a long time," he said.

The financial tabulations show outstanding figures listed as follows: Concessions brought in \$2,148.75, grand stand receipts were \$2,139.79, gate receipts were \$4,601.45. (Continued on page 8)

CREATE FUND FOR ENDOWMENT WITH RICHARDSON GIFT

The Presbyterian and Baptist churches will use the gifts left them by the will of the late T. G. Richardson to carry on their church programs and to meet current expenses.

Mr. Richardson's gift of \$500 to the Baptists will be spent to have the roof of the church wing repaired, to pay insurance which is overdue and to re-floor the parsonage. The balance will be placed in the building fund.

Presbyterians have found two places to put the \$1,000 given them by Mr. Richardson. Of this amount, \$500 is to be used as the nucleus for a permanent endowment fund. The remainder will be expended to meet current expenses.

The Methodist church was also given \$1,000 by this same benefactor and the money has already been used to meet a mortgage on the church house.

This new hymnal will be used by the choir with the hope that eventually the entire congregation will be provided with this much more complete book of songs.

SCHOOLS SURPASS SEAL SALE RECORD

Mrs. Congo's Third Graders Total \$22.50; Thayer School Sells \$7.40

The Christmas seal campaign in Northville township reached the \$134.06 mark when the sale closed here Dec. 19, according to the tabulation released this week by the general chairman, Mrs. Robert Coolman.

This total is slightly higher than that of last year when the seals brought in \$124.39 to be used to wage a fight against the White Plague, tuberculosis. Health statutes will be awarded the classes that sold the most stamps.

In the local schools, Mrs. James Congo's third graders took in \$22.50. If the time element had been a determining factor in the contest, the sale would have been led by Mrs. K. H. Babbitt's fourth graders whose campaigning resulted in totaling \$21.12. Mrs. Congo's room was high last year with a total of \$16.93.

The total taken in by the sale conducted through the rural schools amounted to \$20.65, the Thayer school leading with \$7.40. Second in line was the Clark school with \$6; the Sloan pupils sold \$3.16; and the Hinman school totaled \$2.15.
