Church Forsees Higher Home Costs

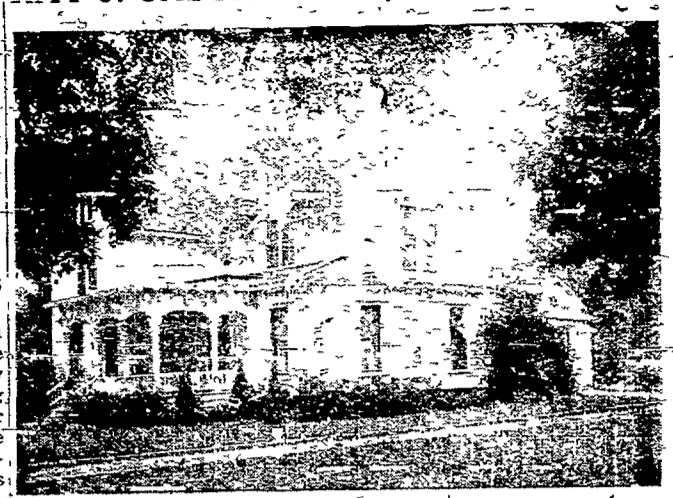

Michigan Society Urges Pre-School Physical Checkup

School day is a month away. The child who is a continual repeater is a financial burden on the town. He may have to repeat his grades because he does not hear well, cannot see clearly, or because he is out of school frequently with aching teeth, diseased tonsils and frequent colds.

Such a child may be the result of parental neglect. The Michigan State Medical society urges parents and guardians to see that all children entering school do so in the best of physical health. Cooperation in this program of preventive medicine, including the correction of remedial defects, guarantees fewer days lost in school during the year, less sickness for the child and fewer worries for the parents.

Vaccination and immunization will protect children against small-pox and diphtheria. The unimmunized child entering school for the first time is the one most apt to catch any disease which may be introduced. There is usually a flare-up of measles, whooping cough and other diseases among young children about a month after the opening of school. Children of varying degrees of health and resistance have been brought from the fresh air and from the freedom of outdoors into closed rooms and into inmate association. They play together they exchange toys; they use the same playground equipment; they share their treasures.
