### SULKOWSKI, 17, IS DROWNED IN MURRAY LAKE

Salem Boy Jumps in Deep Water To Cool Off; Five Friends Watch

#### Drag Lake for Body

The first drowning tragedy of the season to hit Northville and Salem occurred at 7 p. m. Tuesday, June 27, when Oscar Sulkowski, Jr., 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Sulkowski of Salem, drowned in Murray lake on the Ann Arbor road as five of his friends watched from the bank.

Seek Heat Relief  
Oscar and his companions had sought relief from the heat at Murray Lake where the water is more than 50 feet deep in places, according to a report made here Wednesday morning.

Oscar, who couldn't swim and who hadn't been in the water before, jumped into the deep water. His companions could do nothing for him.

Washtenaw county sheriff deputies recovered the body four hours later after dragging the lake.

#### Hold Rites Today

Last rites will be held for him at 2 p. m. Friday, June 30, from the Casteline funeral home. The Rev. Harry J. Lord of the Methodist church will conduct the service. Burial will be made in Rural Hill cemetery.

Besides his father and mother, Oscar is survived by nine brothers and sisters. His father has been a driver for the Ely Coal and Ice company for the past 15 years. Oscar had been employed at a greenhouse near Plymouth.

### STINSON FACTORY GETS GOVERNMENT PLANE CONTRACT

The Stinson Aircraft Division of the Aviation Manufacturing Corporation of Wayne the Stinson plant and factory located at Northville, has been awarded a \$1,500,000 contract for construction of planes for military purposes, according to an announcement released this week from Washington by the War Department.

#### First Army Contract

The order marks the first time in Stinson history that military planes will be built by that company, although it has been building aircraft for more than a decade.

It is noted that the army order comes comparatively close on the heels of the announcement of the Stinson 155-A small three-place, spin and stall proof plane designed and announced early this spring. Orders for the 155 have been received at such a rate that production of the plane has been stepped up to three craft a day, making it necessary to add a number of new men to the force.

#### Size of Order Is Secret

In a statement issued in Washington, Louis Johnson, assistant secretary of war, kept secret the number of craft involved in the order, but current prices of this type of aircraft would place the total at approximately 100 planes. The award of the contract followed the winning by the Stinson entry of the design competition at Wright Field, Dayton, O.

### Wilcox's Examiners Will Issue Licenses Here on Wednesdays

A representative from Sheriff Thomas C. Wilcox's office will be in the Village Hall from 2 to 5 p. m. every Wednesday to issue licenses to operators and chauffeurs living outside the corporate limits of any city or village in Wayne county, in accordance with changes made by the legislators in the laws covering the issuance of licenses and chauffeur's licenses will cost \$2 and will run for one year from the date of issuance.

No photograph of applicants will be necessary on the new application. A change in the definition of the word chauffeur has been made to not only include those already covered by that phrase but to include all drivers of milk, bread and bakery trucks, even though they may be paid on a commission. It also includes all drivers of vehicles used in transporting for gain any merchandise for display, sale or delivery.

#### Ewins and Webber Suffer Injuries in Car Collision

Alec Ewins, 56 years old, was still in critical condition at St. Joseph Mercy hospital, Pontiac, according to late reports, from injuries suffered Thursday morning, June 27, while driving to work, when his car was struck by a west bound Grand Truck freight train at Benning road crossing.

Richard Weber, 38 and son-in-law of Ewins, who was also in the car was likewise in the hospital with serious injuries.

According to an account of the accident related by Weber to authorities, the men's attention was attracted to a dog, running across a field, near the railroad track, just as they approached the crossing. Weber said they did not hear a warning whistle from the train, and only saw the oncoming locomotive as the front end of the car reached about 50 feet before the train could be stopped.

Ewins suffered a broken hip, broken ribs, brain concussion, broken nose and other injuries. Weber received a broken arm and head lacerations. Both men have families and live near Wolverine Lake.

The Michigan Public Expenditure Survey is a state-wide organization designed to give technical assistance and direction to numerous leagues which is being considered for organization, in the village.

According to Mr. Salzman, the organization bases its activity on the need for widespread understanding of governmental processes and functions, the value of unbiased independent checks of government expenditures and the support such agencies can give conscientious public officials seeking to bring about functional improvement.

Retiring presidents Northrop and Schoultz welcomed the new president, and presented him with the diamond label pin of the president.

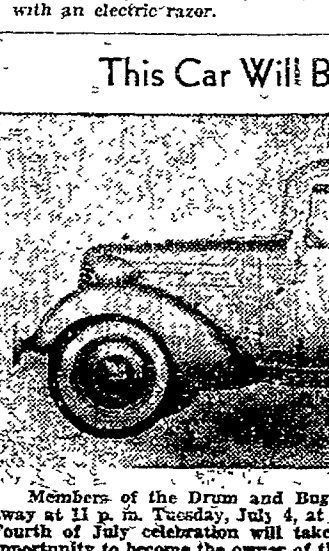
New Officers in Charge

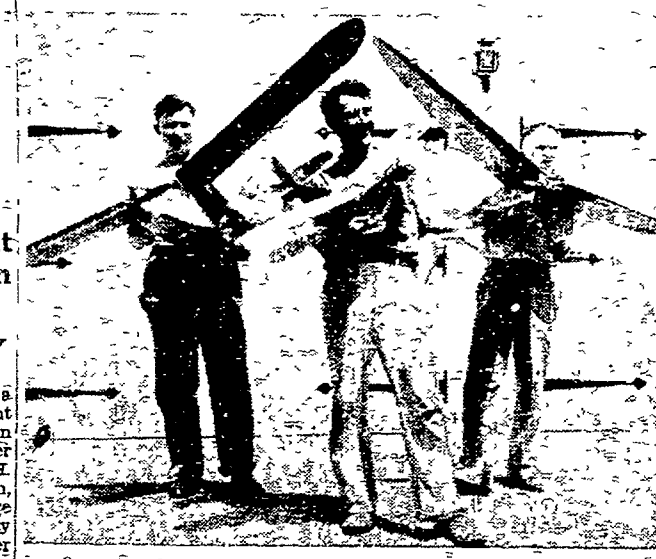

Toward A Sane Fourth . . .

Fireworks, once a mankiller at this season of the year, are not now thanks to Michigan law, the maimer of humans that they once were. The glorious Fourth once fertile with fireworks victims, now turns for prey to the automobile, and finds there a panther even more productive of human blood.

Liberty Bell . . .

As the Fourth of July comes did it ever occur to you that liberty as you and I know it, like the Liberty Bell was made in England and remade in America?

Toward the end of 1751, the Pennsylvania Assembly ordered a bell from England. It was to be a good bell of about 2,000 pounds weight and to cost about 300 pounds sterling.

The bell was made by Thomas Lester, of Whitechapel, London, and sent to Philadelphia. The bell broke in ringing after its arrival. Plans were made for sending it back to England, but the return of the bell was delayed.

When the Pass and Stow bell was tried out in April, 1752, it developed that they had added too much copper, and the tone was not satisfactory. They made another casting to remedy the defect. In the American casting the inscription was slightly changed. Certain words and characters were omitted or abbreviated, and others (in Biblical quotation) extended, using "throughout" for "through," and "unto" for "to."

The Liberty Bell is now on display in the old State House in Philadelphia. A printed card beside it states, in part: "It rang on the 8th of July, 1776, to call citizens together to hear the proclamation of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence."

As the Liberty Bell rang out its message in 1776, and has reverberated through the years, may its inspiration and its message ring out again in the hearts of true Americans who know and appreciate America, and the American way.

With national defense budgets of seven major nations aggregating some \$15,000,000,000 this year the world needs a quieting influence. "We wonder if spiritual rearmament keeps apace?"

Michigan's Fireworks Law . . .

"Any person who shall offer for sale, expose for sale or sell at retail, give, furnish, use, explode, or cause to explode, any firecracker, torpedo, skyrocket, Roman candle, Daygo bomb, or other fireworks of like construction, or any fireworks containing any explosive or inflammable compound, or other device commonly used and sold as fireworks, containing nitrates, chlorates, etc., shall be guilty of a misdemeanor."

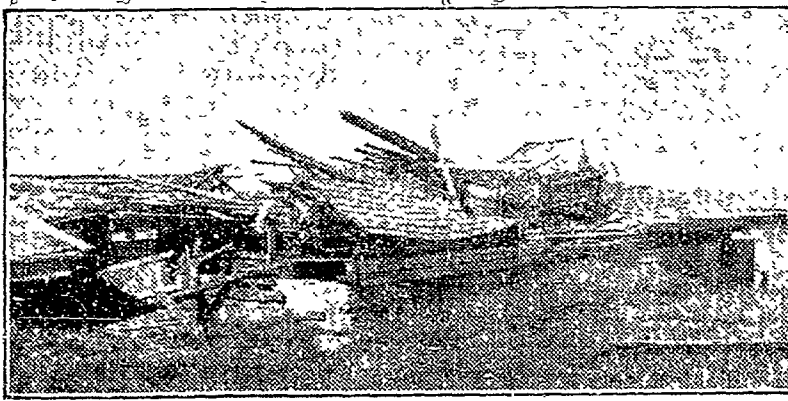
