

• Liberty Bell

-As the Fourth of July comes did it ever occur to you that liberty as you and I know it, like the Liberty Bell was made in England and remade in America? The Magna Charta, the foundation of democracy and human freedom was wrested from the barons in England. The Declaration was wrested from the barons in England. The Declaration of Independence and the American Constitution remade liberty after the American fashion. Perhaps there is some significance in the history of the Liberty Bell? Here are a few highlights in the history of the Liberty Bell:

Toward the end of 1951, the Pennsylvania Assembly ordered a bell from England. It was to be "a good bell of about 2000 pounds, weight," and to cost about 100 pounds seeing.

It was to be inscribed with the words: "By order of the Assembly of the Province of Pennsylvania, for the State House in the City of Philadelphia, 1752," and the quotation from the Rible: "Proclaim liberty through all the land to all the inhabitants thereof" (Leviticus XXV. 10).

The bell was made hy-Thomas Lister, of Whitechapel, London, and sent to Philadelphia. The bell broke in ringing after its arrival. Plans were made for sending it back to England, but the return of the bell was delayed. During the wait, two American workmen, John Pass and Charles Stow, Sr., were permitted to melt and remold the bell.

Fr., were permitted to melt and remode the bell.

When the Pass and Stow bell was tried out in April, 1752, it developed that they had added too much copper, and the tone was not satisfactory. They made another casting to remedy the defects. In the American casting the unscription was slightly changed. Certain words and characters were omitted or abbreviated, and others (in Biblical quotation) extended, using "throughout" for "through," and "unto" for "to." In connection with the inscription, it is interesting to note that the name of the i rovince is written "Pensylvania," a misspelling of the word. misspelling of the word.

The Liberty Bell is now on display in the old State House in Philadelphila. A printed card beside it states, in part. "It rang on the 8th of July 1776, to call citizens together to hear the proclamation of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence. In the adjoining yard it rang it each successive antitersary of the adoption of the Declaration until 1835. It broke July & that year, while tolling during the funeral solumnities of Jehn Marshall, Chief Justice of the United States.

As the Liberty Bell-rang out its message in 1776, and has reverberated through the years, may its inspiration and its message ring out again in the hearts of true Americans who-know and appreciate America, and the Ameri-
