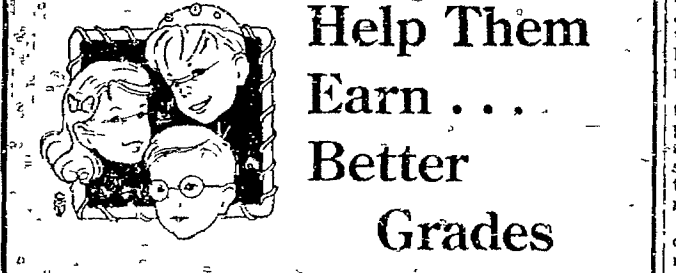

## - to THE VOTERS of Northville School District

No. 2, Fractional

This letter is written to acquaint you with certain facts which occurred previous to and at the last annual meeting of your School District, July 10th, 1939.

One of the members of the Northville Board of Education became ineligible last November. In full knowledge of this fact the other Board members have neglected to fill the vacancy.

The resignation of the unqualified member was in the hands of the president of the Board before the annual meeting July 10th. It was mandatory that the occurring vacancy be filled by the electors of the District at that time, and not at the discretion of the Board.

Certain members, however, have preferred to defranchise you, that they may appoint a member of their own choosing. This has been admitted to me by one of those members.

Michigan School Law requires that when a vacancy occurs on a school board, the remaining members shall, within twenty days, appoint a qualified person to fill the office until the next annual meeting, at which time the vacancy is filled for the remainder of the unexpired term. Should they fail to do this, it becomes mandatory that the Township Board make the appointment. This fact was called to the attention of the Chairman of the Township Board — with what result?

Because both boards have failed to act, petitions are now on file with the Board of Education, requesting that a special election be held to fill the vacancy.

Should it become necessary to carry the request to court, it is comforting to know that we electors will incur no expense. The School Board has been promised free legal services, and therefore will not suffer for its failure to be governed by the laws of the State.

I am interested in your electing new and qualified members. I assure you that this is my only motive in placing these facts before you.

a combine is likely to have more moisture than that harvested with the binder and shocked and then threshed.

The grain bins should be thoroughly cleaned and lined with paper before threshing time so they can be easily covered and fumigated. Frequent losses from grain infesting pests and the requirements for Federal loans where only clean grain is considered should make the lining of all bins a standard practice in Michigan.

Fumigation of grain in the bin can be done by using two pounds of propylene dichloride mixture to each 100 cubic feet of space under cover. Temperature of grain must be about 70 degrees F. and fumigation continued for 48 hours.

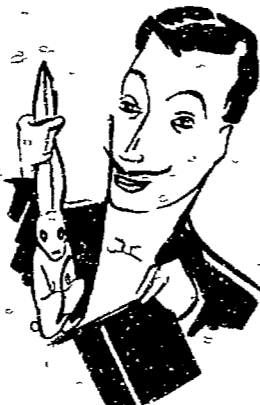
