### Stable To House 30 Horses Nears Completion

John Haller is Owner; Frank Ragsdale To Manage New Enterprise

Construction of a new stable is going forward at such a rate on the former Grennan property on Sheldon road, that Manager Frank Ragsdale expects that the moving of some 20 horses into the stalls can take place within three weeks.

This stable, which is to be built for some 30 horses, is to be 170 by 40 feet and will have a 25 foot inside aisle for working the horses. By fall, it is the intention of the owner, John Haller of Detroit, to build an inside ring. In all, the enterprise will cost about \$17,000. The stable now being erected will cost \$7,500.

It is to be a commercial stable, with chills and lounge rooms. Horses will be boarded and rented.

Manager Ragsdale says that at present it is impossible to tell how much of a staff will be needed to keep the stable in operation. "We'll be adding to the staff as we find need for them," he affirmed.

Walled Lake high school band and its soloists, received considerable recognition to the school, Friday and Saturday of last week, resulting from participation in the annual senior high school instrumental festival and clinic held at Ann Arbor.

In competition with bands from Lapeer, Colfax, Traverse, City, Birmingham, Vassar, Grandville, Mt. Morris, Hillsdale, Marquette, Lowell and Walled Lake, the Walled Lake band finished with an average of better than 98 points for a second division rating in class B schools. Frank Bach is the band director and instrumental supervisor.

Competing in the soloist competition among one of the largest field of entries yet experienced for class B schools, John Edward Booth, first runner up, and Robert Conant, playing the French horn, made second division, while third division averages were received by Charlotte Heliker, pianist and Arthur Heliker, saxophonist.

### Moderator Talks Monday to 300 Presbyterians

Tells of Agricultural Experiments in India; To Sail June 28

Speaking in the Presbyterian church which was filled to capacity Monday evening, Apr. 29, Dr. Samuel Higgenbottom told delegates from 14 churches in the Detroit Presbytery of the agricultural progress that has been made in India since he first went there in 1903.

Dr. Higgenbottom will return to India, June 28, with Mrs. Higgenbottom, after being in this country for two years. He is the moderator of the General Assembly. He is president of Allahabad Christian College in India, beginning his career as an instructor in economics at Ewing Christian college. What he saw there of rural conditions, India's famine and poverty problems lay in modern farming methods. He used a Japers' hospital as his work shop in proving his agricultural theories.

A highlight of the evening program was music sung by the Welsh Male quartet of Detroit, marking the second appearance of the group in Northville this spring. The quartet sang at the dining hour as well before and after Dr. Higgenbottom's speech. The quartet is composed of J. E. Richards, R. M. Williams, W. G. Williams and A. L. Olsen. Miss Edith Baggott is the accompanist.

Preceding Dr. Higgenbottom's talk, a dinner was served in the church house by the Nellie Yerkes Smith pastor, presided. The invocation was given by the Rev. William R. Van Buren, chairman of the committee on foreign missions of the Presbytery. The Rev. Dr. Arthur W. Ratz presided at the session which was held in the sanctuary. The prayer was given by the Rev. John R. McWilliams of the Redford church. The benediction was given by the Rev. Dr. William H. Marbach of the Bonaventure First Presbyterian church. Mrs. Gerald Harrison presided at the organ.

Delegates numbering 300 were present from the following communities: Northville, Eastminster, Grandale, Milford, Plymouth, Pontiac Redford, Roseale Gardens, Royal Oak, South Lyon and Springfield.

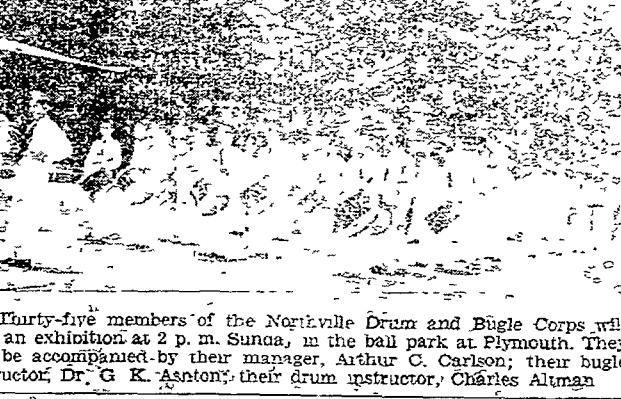

### Northville Hunt Is Organized at Subscription Breakfast

The Northville Hunt came into being Sunday, Apr. 28, at a subscription breakfast held in the Hotel Mayflower, Plymouth. It is a direct development of the Northville Paper Chase association which has been dissolved.

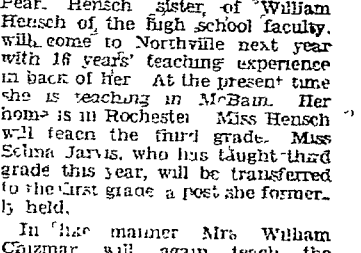

At the close of the meeting, 15 of the Scouts who had paid into the surplus fund, had ice cream at the league parlour.

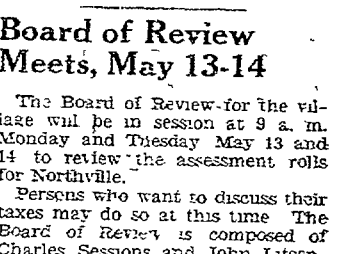

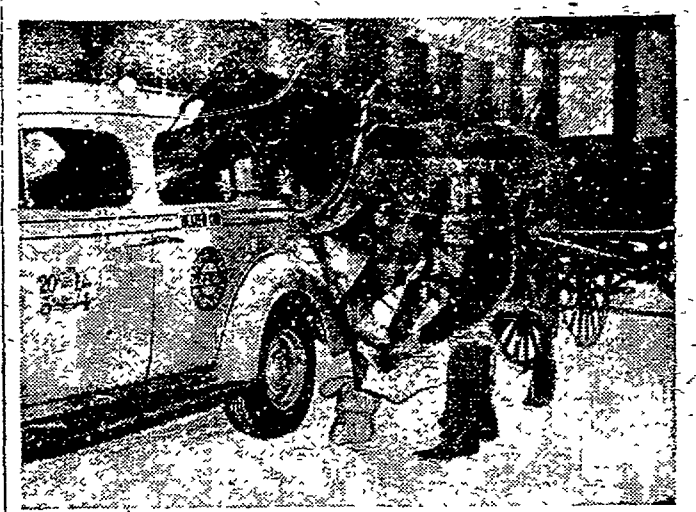

Because I had a fear that America would be brought into the conflict I decided to get back to my home country.

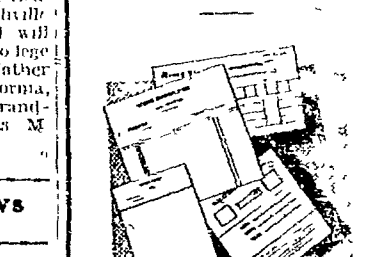
