We have personally known Mr. Eaton for many years and hold him in highest esteem, and we know that his honesty of purpose and untiring energy in working for the causes he endorses, will command your respect. We are willing to stake our honor on his integrity and honesty of mind and heart.

This is one opportunity to elect a state officer who is absolutely against bossism and graft in politics and state government, and his election will be just one step closer to a clean state government, in the interests of all the people of this state. His election at this time is especially desirable, because there are sinister influences working hard and also spending a great deal of money, not only to defeat honesty in government, but because their success means enormous profits to them.

The present rains have revived lawns that were looking quite brown and burned.

An application of a 10-6-4 fertilizer applied at the rate of 10 pounds per 1000 square feet as soon as the grass dries off and then washed in with a coarse spray will give the grass vigorous growth and promote a thick sod for the winter.

Crab grass is one of the worst pests in a lawn if it isn't too thick. Pulling the plants before they get rooted at the joints is a sure method. Try to prevent reseeding by catching the grass clippings containing the seed heads and burn them.

Establishing a thick sod in the spring will tend to smother out the young plants which are annuals.

On 110 acres of varied types of soil each youth spends 2½ hours daily in growing and caring for crops. The remainder of the day is spent in the workshop and classrooms in work and studies related to agriculture.




