



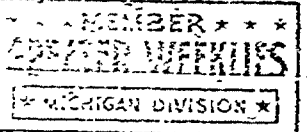

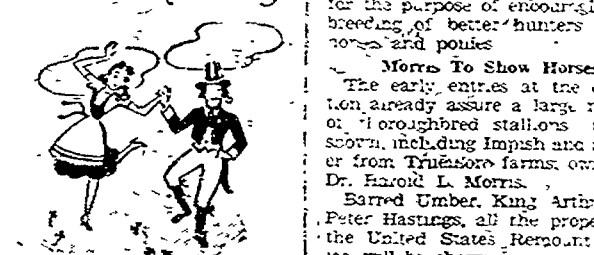

Home Accidents Cause 1,200 Deaths

Home accidents in Michigan caused 1,257 deaths in 1940, says the Michigan Department of Health. This was nearly three-fourths the automobile fatalities in the state last year.

"Most of the fatal home accidents occurred among persons 65 years of age and older," says Dr. H. Allen Moyer, State Health Commissioner. "There were 689 such deaths in 1940 and 624, or 91 per cent, of them were caused by falls."

Home accidents took the lives of 194 children under five years of age last year. Sixty-four of the deaths resulted from burns and explosions and 50 were caused by suffocation due to clothing, blankets or pillows.

The causes of home accident deaths in 1940 were: falls 750, burns and explosions 228, suffocation 61, poisoning 40, poisonous gas 46, firearms 27, miscellaneous 105.

M. S. C. Reaches 73,706 Women

Goals for efforts of the 1941 program in home economic extension service reach a new high level with a summary showing that in 1940 the 73,706 rural women in the state who participated in the projects of child care, clothing, home management or nutrition.

Staff members and home demonstration agents on the Michigan State College staff are holding meetings throughout the state. These meetings permit groups to indicate what studies they want continued, with additional stress in 1941 on community problems.

Actual enrollment in 1940 projects numbered 25,302 women, says Miss Edna V. Smith, state leader on the college staff. But there were 73,706 non-members who obtained information as visitors or from those actually enrolled. In all, the women found information that led them to make 133,378 changes in home practices.

In three counties alone, women enrolled in clothing projects estimated the dresses they made represented a saving of \$1,419. In four counties, tailoring hints permitted savings of \$1,001.

In 27 counties where home furnishing was a project, the women estimated they saved \$25,926 by reupholstering furniture, caring chairs or making slip covers.

The work reaches into every county in the state. Specialists on the college staff cooperate with the local leaders who numbered 3,499 in 1940. In 12 counties there are special home demonstration agents. Other counties are served as a district or direct from the college.

GENERAL HUGH S. JOHNSON Says

Washington, D. C.
In a friendly debate with Major George Fielding Elliot on War possibilities, two of the principal schools of so-called thought were seen in pretty clear profile.

On a few basic guesses there was complete agreement; that this country is in no danger of invasion in the measurable future, that Germany will not be successful in an invasion of England this year and that her chance of doing it later will probably decline, that there is no prospect that England will lose her mastery of the ocean this year.

So much seems to be a pretty general consensus of opinion among fairly well informed students of the problem of war as they affect us. Beyond that, there is disagreement.

Between the two nations, as he correctly says, is control of air dominating point on all the oceans: England itself, Gibraltar, Suez, Aden, Singapore, Corregidor, Capetown, the Falkland Islands, Panama, Honduras, Hawaii and all the great American bases on both coasts.

Coupled with the superiority of the two fleets, he thinks no land power can at length prevail. To all this he adds, and his adversaries agree, that England alone could never retake on land, the German conquests in northern Europe; that it could be done, if at all, only with a sea A.E.F. of millions, which he does not favor, and that Russia is no great threat on the German east flank.

To most of that, the opposing argument is "O.K., but how is the war to be won by Britain?" His premises have only one answer and he makes it frankly—economic domination of Germanyized Europe or a British blockade and battle of Germany from the air, naval forces in the Japanese sea and the Indian Ocean.

The only alternative, he believes, is a "sit tight" policy, based on the military and naval strength of the United States. He says that the United States is not only the greatest industrial power in the world, but also the greatest military power, and that it is in a position to win the war, if it is not forced to do so by the German and Japanese aggressions.

There are two proposals. You pay your money and you take your choice.
CONVOY SHIPS TO BRITAIN
We are going to convoy ships carrying aid to Britain. There is no doubt that a provision in the lease-lend bill prohibiting the President from using American armed forces on the high seas to protect American property, would be an unconstitutional congressional interference with his constitutional power as commander in chief of the armed forces.

Except for some psychological popular effect, it could be useless, null and void.
Just now, popular opinion is so much against convoys, which would be a direct venture into war, that it probably would not be attempted at present. But a most skillful job has been done of leading popular opinion closer and closer to war, and also of so timing action as not to offend it. It is easy to see how a change to favor convoys could occur.

Some time later in the year our industrial mobilization will begin to disgorge vast quantities of supplies. The British demand for them will be great. The lease-lend bill will be a law and there will be no financial or other hindrance to sending them. Also Hitler's major effort to blockade Britain on and under the sea will be at its peak and cargo sinkings will multiply.

Then we shall hear: "Are we just building ships and supplies for Hitler to sink? A ton of supplies on the docks of Liverpool can help win this war."
