Starting with a big bonfire lighting the sky close to midnight of the third, through to the finale of the fireworks everyone reported a good time, a great day, and suggestions for another celebration in 1942.

The Parade

The parade in charge of Charles Schmitz, Mrs. Donald Warr and Judy Lepman made a big hit as it moved from the Scout building to the Village Library. Led by a decorated car, the massed colors of Scouts, the Legion, Cubs, Camp Fire Girls, the Drum and Bugle Corps, the parade moved off at 11:20 a.m. The Cub Scouts float and the Recreation Department float represented contrast as compared with the Scout refugees carrying high with household furniture, family attached and dog and goat trailing. The newly decorated parade float carried a decorated sign, a baby buggy, and then some 50 boys and girls on decorated bicycles made a colorful sight. A baby buggy with the old lady, a decorated express wagon, the Camp Fire Girls and 200 children with flags really made everyone sit up and take notice.

At the Library

At the library the merchants paid off the Supervisor Willard in very appropriate words, presented the flag to Mayor (Mrs.) H. Bryan and Commissioner S. B. O'Brien of the Legion, and all of them at attention as the flag was raised to full mast as the brazier scattered the colors. Prime dinner was served in the park and Alfred Shaw received the flag for the largest display in the village.

At a dinner, a spirited football battle between opposing teams of French pulled a big hit with the crowd and then Augustus and Orlow Green accounted for a delightful evening when the boys turned the nose on that as he did it, announcing from the roof of the bar, porch of the Village Hall.

Drowning Dangers Greater for Boys

If there's a school boy in your family, he will run
nine times the risk of drowning this summer than his sister
will, according to figures reported by the Michigan Department of Health.

With the summer months at hand, when two-thirds of
all drownings occur, parents will want to know what the
chief hazards in swimming are, and these are two. Usually
the boy who drowns can't swim at all, or he can't swim
well and attempts something beyond his ability.

What's needed, as lifeguards often say, is more swimming
lessons, not more sense in the water. The old
rules are good: don't swim alone, don't show off in the
water, don't swim in a pool or lake where there are un-
expected deep holes.

Last year, 36 boys and only four girls of high school age
drowned in Michigan. The same nine to one proportion also
applied to drownings as a whole. Out of 247 persons
who drowned in the state last year, 222 were males and 25
were females. Half of all persons drowned were below
age 22.

At all age groups, more boys than girls drown, and do
girls and women. The 1940 figures for certain age groups
are:

Two-thirds of Michigan drownings occur in the three
summer months. Last year's were June 15, July
7, August 5, or 106 of the year's total of 247.

If you were to visit Burdell's Press Clipping Bureau in downtown
Minneapolis, you'd find a hundred young girls doing a thing by reading
newspapers and magazines. The offices, which overlook the Hudson
river, are quiet as a library reading room, and all you see are news-
papers stacked on piles ready to be read and clipped. Harold Wynne, a
young college graduate who is president of this annual organization,
says "Our girls enjoy reading the Northville Record because it con-
tains so many interesting items about our clients."

Burdell's Press Clipping Bureau started back in 1888 with two
readers and a bundle of papers. Frank Burdell, the originator of the
clipping bureau for him and friends of Burdell's, overheard one man say
another if he had seen the article in the morning paper which mention-
ed his name, from this one occasion began an organization which today
has branches all over the world and spends more than \$100,000
yearly on newspaper and magazine subscriptions.

Michigan Farm Facts

New knowledge of Michigan farm homes and farm
improvements in recent decades is demonstrated by the
1940 in 10th census of the United States.

Ten years ago, a Michigan farm home in 1930 was
erected with an average of 1.64 acres of land. Today,
in the state, the average farm home is 2.4 acres. More
than two million farm homes now are on hard
surfaced roads as there were none 10 years ago. An extra
15,000 homes have gravel, shell or shale surfacing over
the winter-reporting that type of road surfacing can
last 10 years.

Proof that Michigan agriculture is substantially
found, irrespective of the census figures. Less than half the
farms in the state are mortgaged and of those that are
mortgaged the amount for each farm has been reduced
from an average of \$2,531 in 1930 to \$1,870 in 1940.

The average age of a Michigan farmer is just over
50 years. Approximately two-thirds of the farmers have
been on their farms five years or more. Taxes per \$100
of value average 90 cents as compared to \$2.67 in 1930.

Farming is a serious business. Proof of that is found
in the motor car and tractor figures in the census. The
average age of the cars and tractors on Michigan farms
indicates they are the same, the 1933 models.

Some farmers find time to gain outside pay. About one
farmer in three reported working off his farm, usually
non-farm work. This total of outside work in a year's
time was 9,638,294 days, compared to 6,347,179 days
worked away from home farms in 1930.
