A Salute to Michigan Education

I am greatly interested in the educational system of my native State. Unquestionably, the honor of leadership in education belongs to Michigan. To illustrate, let me call your attention to the six important educational dates that mark the educational progress of Michigan.

In 1827, the Legislature of the Territory of Michigan sketched in detail on paper, a full program of education from the primary schools to the universities.

In 1827, the Legislature of the Territory of Michigan actually laid the foundation of our common schools.

In 1837, our State Legislature, after the admission of Michigan to the Union, created our great university with its then four departments—literature, science and the arts, law, and medicine. This was pioneer work in many respects, for all the world. Other States had established fragments of such a system, but none had constructed it on so profound a basis. Nothing remained for Michigan to do in education except to elaborate the details and enlarge the structure of our educational system.

Therefore, in 1848, the Legislature of the State of Michigan, realizing that handicapped children were not receiving proper education in our State, created an institution for the instruction of the deaf, dumb, and blind.

In 1855, the Legislature of the State of Michigan organized an agricultural and industrial college, one of the first pioneering agricultural colleges in the United States.

And then, to cap the climax, in 1879, the Legislature of the State of Michigan opened the doors of our university to women, thereby completing the educational system of Michigan and establishing the thorough democracy of the educational scheme.

I am particularly proud of the stand that Michigan has taken on education. In my own State, the Superintendent of Public Instruction and the entire school personnel of the State, superintendents, principals, and all grades of teachers have demonstrated their love and zeal and efficiency for our public-school system.

Except from an address delivered by Hon. William W. Whitney on July 31 as part of a series of Michigan lectures sponsored by the National Y. W. C. A., Washington, D. C.

A total of 10,511 young people of the State of Michigan were participating in the out-of-school work program of the National Youth Administration as of June 18, according to Orin W. Kaye, state NYA administrator. Of this number 2,221 were from Wayne county.

All in a Lifetime

In his seventy-eighth year, Henry Ford has started something new again. His 1938 Mr. Ford was venturing, and last week he gave the world a product, as yet not perfected, that will eventually revolutionize the automobile world—the plans for an automobile Cab. It is that in his lifetime that Henry Ford has done more than any other one man to change the whole pattern of life in our country and perhaps throughout the world. Think it over.

Mr. Ford pioneered in the automobile business and retired millions of horses in favor of gasoline engines. Henry Ford produced articles that millions of men and women wanted—in many cases more than they wanted—homes or farms or families. Ford brought high wages and mass production to industry and cashed in on the theory that workmen can also be customers. The automobile industry created demands for rubber and for oil, for mohair and a thousand and one other items used in the manufacture of automobiles.

Ford has already made an industrial market for soy beans and his scientists are working on plans for the conversion of wheat and corn into products to take the place of steel and metal alloys.

The Detroit motor magnate who built an industrial empire from scratch has changed the living habits and the riding habits of the whole world. His contribution to the welfare of mankind has been probably as great as that of any one man in modern history.

Have you noticed the illuminated paint now being used to mark the no passing zones on U. S.-16? This is a glass bead paint and has a great amount of reflectivity. It certainly helps on 16.

It was pointed out that the glass bead paint, which has proved highly successful on the Pennsylvania turnpike, is not only more visible at night because of light reflected from the glass beads, but also could be more clearly seen than ordinary paint in the daylight.

The paint, bright yellow in color, is applied in the customary manner. A container for the small glass beads, which compare in size to granulated sugar, is installed on the paint spreader; this permits the beads to be spread on the wet paint, providing reflectability not present with ordinary road markings.

According to reports received by the state highway department, the new paint has approximately three times the wearing quality of ordinary paint, and while somewhat more expensive to apply, its durability is expected to make it no more costly than that now used.

Thanks to the alertness of Novi township officials and the Oakland county Road Commission the Novi road now has a white line demarcating the center of the highway. It greatly facilitates driving on this stretch of highway.

The Farmers' Corner

On the infected choke cherry leaves the areas between the veins turn red, or yellow, and the leaves remain green.

On the peach, the symptoms appear in mid-July, at that time red, purple or yellow discolored areas appear between the veins on the leaves.

The discolored areas soon fall out, leaving ragged edges. The leaves soon fall except for one or two small green leaves at the tips of the infected branches.

Without someone kindly reminding us that we were on private ground and that we should move on, we would have stayed there for a long time.

These men lived to see the virgin pine practically exterminated and the so-called hardwoods disappearing at an alarming rate.

Virgin Pine Scarce This section was at one time covered with a beautiful stand of

pine and hardwood. Within a space of 30 years the pine was wiped out and a beginning was made in cutting of other kinds of timber.

There are old lumbermen who came here among the early settlers. They saw the Menominee Range before the woodman's axe sounded throughout the forest. It was their belief that the pine would last forever—that it would be impossible ever to cut it all, and that hardwood lumber would never have much of any value.

Hence the idea was conceived by Iron county officials acquiring strips of timber 400 feet in width along main highways and thus having a permanent snow fence in the winter and a pleasing scenic view in the summer. Iron county's

example was adopted later by the state highway department.

Historical Markers "Where ancient Indian trails cross our main highways, suitable markers have been erected. We have included in Pentoga Park on Chippewa Lake an old Indian village and cemetery which today is one of our most popular places.

State Highway Policy The practice of acquiring timber strips along tourist roads has been followed diligently by the state highway department. Furthermore, thousands of pine trees have been planted in some sections along state routes by the Civilian Conservation Corps.

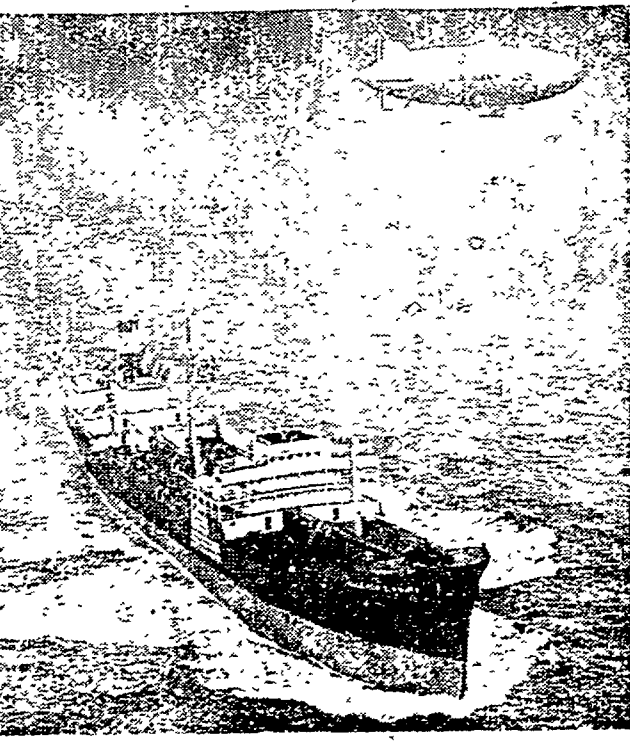

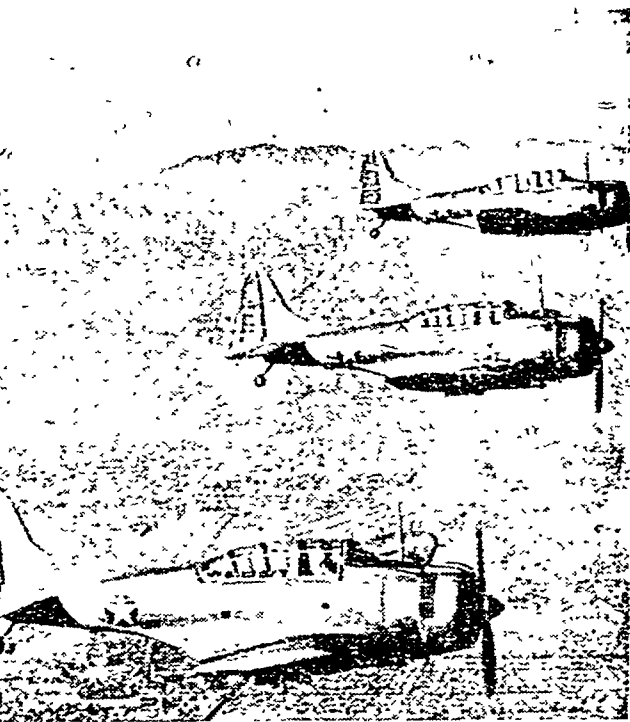
