**Training—** Life in Michigan will be different in 1942.

Looking upon an "all-out" war with the Axis as a temporary interruption in the normal course of business, Michigan may expect changes during the coming year to include the following:

As to the defense services, 600,000 men will be mobilized between the ages of 18 and 45—or a total of more than one million Michigan men subject to war duty, if physically qualified and if needed by the nation. Of this group the men between the ages of 20 and 45 will be liable to call for combat service.

The registration call, issued last Monday (Jan. 5), affects 55,000,000 men between the ages of 18 and 45 years. Michigan's total there will be about one-twentieth of Uncle Sam's potential manpower for prosecution of the war. Even a half billion men, taken from normal economic use, would result in drastic changes throughout the state.

Yes, life is going to be different.

**Old, Old Story**

The blunt plan talk of Winston Churchill at Washington and Ottawa made a profound impression on Americans.

Just as our pre-Christmas prosperity came was scattered by the treacherous Japanese raids on Pearl Harbor, later duplicated or bracketed by the bombing of Manila during the "holidays" our attitude on the war underwent a major readjustment during the Churchill-Roosevelt conference.

Despite the encouraging headlines of Nazi defeat in Russia, the fact remains that war is going on for a three-year war. Production of arms, growing as it has been, is totally inadequate to meet new needs.

**State of Services**

And to what? The new trends that the United States is following in the war, must be the greater realization of the World War I spirit here or other to fit into the new pattern which demands a sacrifice of our sacrifices in Michigan are just beginning.

Michigan automobile factories are to be converted nearly 100 per cent into war plants. What has been expected by an industry that has been a leader in military equipment will be temporary unemployment of several hundred thousand workers plus the readjustment imposed upon thousands of other people.

Automotive activities will cease to emphasize new models but will center on servicing present cars.

Because of metal shortages, the manufacturing of new cars will be limited to trucks, stock cars, light trucks and many other essential vehicles that are important to the war.

How would the car that has become an elaborate recreation when the government revealed the extent of restrictions on sale of automobiles? Only persons who have urgent and vital need for the rubber product will be permitted to buy in 1942. Thousands of automobiles may be forced off the highways in England the thousands have caused thousands of deaths.

**Tourist Business**

The 1941 tourist business in Michigan should not be drastically affected by the restriction, but some curtailment may be anticipated. The 1942 season will be uncertain.

Retracer tires will replace new tires, to a certain degree, just as automobile repair work is expected to replace sale of new models.

A 35 per cent reduction in demand of gasoline is also forecast. In turn, curtailment of gasoline will reduce the state's income from gasoline taxes for highway use. Fewer car licenses will be needed. The 1941 income of nearly \$60,000,000 may shrink to \$45,000,000 of \$40,000,000. In turn this would force re-investment in highway building, and so on. The vice is long.

Experience of the Michigan tourist business during the last war was favorable. When pressure mounts, need for relaxation rises. Paradoxically, eight clubs in England and Canada have been doing a thriving business.

**Defense Needs**

Last week the state deficit was wiped out just one year earlier than Budget Director Leo Nowicki thought was possible.

A year and a half of \$1,555,000 from the state liquor control commission, representing payment to the general fund from Michigan's liquor sale monopoly, was responsible. On top of this the commission paid \$1,289,000 to the federal government in liquor taxes.

Thus the state ended 1941 with a balance of around \$50,000 in the bank.

Amusement taxes, income from the state lottery, and other sources will be needed to meet the state's needs.

The National Defense Training program is well under way in Northville. Courses to be taught will depend upon the information given in the questionnaires which have been sent to the Ford employees at the local plant.

E. V. Ellison, director of the program, has contacted the Kelsey-Hayes company in Plymouth, in an effort to further the plans for the carrying out of the program.

Members of a newly formed Advisory Council for Defense Training will meet at 8:30 p.m. Monday, Jan. 12, to make plans for the starting of the program.

The council is made up of R. H. Amersman, superintendent of schools; Howard I. Brown, school board representative; Ernest DeWitt, labor representative of the Ford plant; Lloyd Lambert, labor representative of the Kelsey-Hayes plant; C. W. Truett, Jr., management representative of the Ford plant; Clarence Davis, management representative of the Davis Tool and Engine Works company; Mr. Ellison, director of the program; and Mr. Doern, president of the Ford local.

(Written in a deck chair aboard the S. S. Cotacaca, en route from Curacao to Port-of-Spain, Trinidad)

Now that we are safely away from Curacao and lying in a neutral port, I shall be able to write without the limitations of censorship.

You see I almost got into trouble. I hope you will recall that last week's column was at least descriptive, if not informative, of the intense military activity on an island at war. At that time I was unaware that all mail to and from Curacao is censored. And only on the way to the post office with it was I so informed. Five minutes later— and I am sure I could have been summarily deported from Curacao or shot at sunrise or something equally drastic.

I certainly had no intention of writing anything so patently censorable. I only wished to describe the life of a man with a courageous Dutch wife still fighting the war.

We were able to mail the letter from La Guaira in Venezuela.
