Take Care of Your Tires

One of the first effects of the war in the Philippines on the people in this town was the immediate action to stop the sale of automobile tires.

It may seem possible to buy tires again to a limited extent, but there is every reason to believe that not nearly enough tires will be made to supply normal needs of the 27,000,000 car owners of this country.

Therefore, any motorist who wants to continue to drive his car in the future should take the best possible care of his present tires. Some ways which this can be done are:

Cut out high speeds. Your tires will last twice as long at 40 miles per hour than at 60 miles per hour.

Don't stop short when you don't have to. That burns off the tread.

Drive with great care over rough roads. Holes and stones can't blow out—and break the cords.

Check your tire pressure. A tire a half inch out of line will be dragged 50 to 80 feet every mile.

Change wheel positions every 5,000 miles.

Don't spend all day in the car. When you hear the tires squeak you have some air out of your tires off.

Inflate tires regularly and to correct pressure get more than three pounds below recommended minimums.

And if your tires don't really work, have them re-treaded. A re-treaded tire, if done correctly, can give you 80 percent as much wear as a new tire.

The current report is to the effect that post offices will sell stamps to cover the "use tax" on automobiles and trucks which gas into effect on February 1. The first payment due in February is \$2.00 and that pays until next July. Thereafter the tax will be \$5 per year. This is not official as yet.

Silent Destruction

The danger of inflation that threatened us before the war is becoming more acute. If there was little time for us to take effective action to control it then, there is even less time now.

Inflation creeps up on a nation silently. But it can be as destructive as bombing planes, and once it has arrived no one is able to escape it.

What does inflation mean to the average person? It means that the value of his pay check may be cut in half—that the price of everything he has to buy may be doubled. A pound of meat may cost more than he now pays for a pair of shoes. A little later a pair of shoes may cost more than he now pays for a suit of clothes. Still later a suit of clothes may cost more than he now pays for a new car.


We're all in the same boat, so far as inflation goes. We all use the same money, and we all have to cooperate to make sure that the money retains its value.
