Cancer Control Month
 One of the most important, and often one of the least understood health problems in Michigan is that of cancer and its control. Because of the fear and mystery that have always surrounded this subject the attitude of the general public is still that cancer is an incurable disease from its beginning and the least said about it the better for all concerned.

While it is true that for hundreds of years there was little hope to offer to the cancer patient, enough is now known about its prevention and control to offer a considerable measure of hope to cancer sufferers. Authorities say that if all the known scientific facts about cancer were fully utilized, a reduction of one-third to one-half in the number of deaths would be brought about within a space of five years.

Through research in many laboratories it has been established that early and only early cancer is curable. Cancer in late stages is incurable by any known method of treatment. The only recognized methods of treating cancer today are surgery, X-rays, and radium used singly or combined as the particular type of cancer and the judgment of the physician may dictate. No drug, salve, serum, or any form of faith healing will cure the cancer patient. No one advertising or guaranteeing to cure cancer should ever be consulted by any one who has or suspects cancer.

When the public comes to know such simple, but vital facts as these just mentioned, and seeks the help of competent physicians and reputable hospitals in early stages of their disease, improvements in the cancer situation can be expected.

April has been designated as Cancer Control Month by Congressional Resolution and during this month a nation-wide emphasis is being placed on cancer education.



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WHY SOME TELEPHONE INSTALLATIONS MUST BE LIMITED

If you find that certain telephone requests can no longer be met, the blame lies with the enemies of our country.

To solve this war, we must conserve every possible pound of vital materials.

Critical shortages have caused the War Production Board to issue an order strictly limiting the use of those scarce materials

by the telephone companies in expanding telephone service.

The War Production Board estimates that this conservation program will save annually about 35,500 tons of lead, 29,000 tons of iron and steel, 29,500 tons of copper, and large amounts of zinc, crude rubber, magnesium and other strategic materials.

HOW THE ORDER MAY AFFECT YOU

1. PARTIAL LINES, only, can be installed in many cases.
2. EXTENSION TELEPHONES cannot be installed in residences except where needed by those responsible for public health, welfare or security.
3. TELEPHONES of wall or desk (upright) types cannot be changed to hand sets.
4. MANUAL TELEPHONE SWITCHBOARDS may not be changed to dial except where the work is well advanced.

Commerce Land Planning Committee Begins Activities

By Charles E. Hutton

Members of the newly appointed land use planning committee met for the first time Friday evening at the Commerce school to hear an outline of its proposed activities.

James L. Garner, township supervisor, presented George B. Hurrell, agricultural agent of Michigan State college and Earl D. Bailey, county agricultural agent who explained the work of the committee.

Hurrell stated that the Commerce township group is the sixteenth to be organized in Oakland county thus far. The plan calls for complete organization throughout the state. As explained by Hurrell, the committee is to determine the best use of lands in township regarding present use, and to assist in completing a county and township map by showing these recommendations.

He stated that not over half the land of the county is now recommended for continued farming. The balance is abandoned farm land or land that can be better used in other ways.

Some swamp land is potential farm land, while other similar lands could be drained and used for game conservation or recreation.

The committee is also to consider and recommend best types of farming for the township, and to determine the best agricultural lands, the best yields on the forest acres, and other points.

Karl D. Bailey stated that at present, 90 per cent of the farm income in the county came from dairy farming, with fruit second and general farming third.

Garner brought out the fact that the township's 90 subdivisions presented a difficult problem to the committee at the outset of its deliberations. Joseph Long, a member of the county planning committee suggested that the findings of planning groups throughout the state might be used in a rehabilitation program, following the war, and to determine locations for

standing fields in the immediate future.

Recommendations of the committee in the five neighboring counties will prove vital in the Huron-Clio road development.
