"And I was thinking," said he, "of the need of small men, like me, to keep the big ones in place. They can't take a day of us out."

"That's what they sometimes forget," said I.

"Yes, sir, they forget—but it's not for long. Their walls fall down."

In America today we need the small stones as well as the big stones to build up our wall of defense. Without the little men for the plant must close down. Without the small efforts of the little men the big cause may be lost. No matter how small we are, if we do our part, we can help hold up the wall—I deeply believe.

 Just a suggestion for a practical, personal Fourth of July activity.

July celebration... write a soldier, sailor or marine a letter—tell what a swell guy you think he is, how proud we are of him, and that when he comes home you'll be helping him get started.

You know it's an awful feeling to stand in line and wait for the mail to be delivered, and then not hear your name called. You get sort of sick inside, but after a while you get over it.

So writes a boy from Northville serving in the country's armed forces. And what he has experienced is also the experience of hundreds and hundreds of others. Those boys, away from home, glad of their opportunity to serve their country, ready to make any sacrifice, are waiting for their name to be called. Young men far away, without any tangible connection with home and friends, except those letters the mail clerk hands them. Homesick kids, perhaps hating to admit it, but homesick nevertheless.

It takes such a little effort and time to write a letter. How about sitting down and doing it right now. A letter to the Johnny in your own family at the army camp in Texas or the navy base in Florida... or to the Johnny that grew up in the house next door, or who went to school with your children. It will cost you but little in time but to the boy away at camp, it will mean much. Getting that letter from you, he won't be one of those standing in line who get sort of sick inside when their name isn't called.
