Keeping In Step With Our Times

Essential Dates and Information Affecting the Welfare of the "Vanishing Civilian"

Week by week war is draining off all our pleasure driving, that extra car and a car serving in a hot home, spare or will soon be found memories. And the list goes on—Washington is just kidding us now. But when we start paying next year's taxes we will find that the tax on the pleasure car really goes. We're not the only ones who are being hit. Next year we'll be hit by a tax on the car. There will be tax only about 70 billion dollars worth of goods for civilians.

Food oil, kerosene credit coupons are made permissible up to and including Nov. 23. Watch for ration coupons for your oil and kerosene. Plan for about 25% cut from normal consumption. Just to break the shock, you will be notified when and where to call for the coupons.

If you have a truck, be sure to get your Certificate of Necessity before Nov. 15. Without it no gasoline, parts or supplies will be purchasable. The ODT Office is Boulevard, Bldg. 7310 Woodward ave., Detroit.

Watch your coffee. Merchants' stocks will be frozen Nov. 21. Rationing is scheduled for midnight Nov. 23. Ration is 10.4 pounds per person over 15 years per year. This figure may be changed, of course. Sugar coupons will be used. If you didn't register for sugar get busy or you may be losing out on your coffee.

New farmers, here's news for you. All farm machinery is frozen as of Nov. 1, under a temporary rationing order while machinery for rationing is set up. Freezes do not affect repair parts.

Gas rationing becomes effective Dec. 1st. Local dates for registration for "A" cards is now set up for Nov. 18, 19, 20, 1542 at the Northville grade school. Begin checking tailgate and consumption of gas to see you will have accurate records to explain as you go. Last your tires, record tire numbers, dispose of all extra tire tires for each passenger car. The extra tires to the Railway Express Office for shipment as specified.

Watch for meat and butter rationing in the next months. Be reasonable and patriotic and as our very share of MRAI buy. Sponges iron is in the office to take the place of scrap in the steel mills.

The government wants your pennies for the copper in them. You are supposed to stir up ten pennies (even if you have to rob the kids) and put them in a tin.

If planning on traveling, check out. The government is expected to freeze people to stay home for the winter. This is to avoid travel rationing.

WPI is now asking users of national and manufacturer's to curtail use by keeping houses at 65 and doing only essential cooking on the gas stove. Watch gas use and try to keep it down. The nation's conservation problem and try a pipe cutting on all indoor gas pipes or gas stoves.

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Postponement of Rationing to Dec. 1 Makes Change in Local Dates

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Rationing of "A" Card for All Passenger Car Owners Will Be Done at Northville Grade School and Other Public Schools in Oak and Wayne Counties

According to an announcement from Washington officials the date for gasoline rationing has been postponed from Sunday, Nov. 22, to Tuesday, Dec. 1, 1942. The reason given for the postponement was inability to supply proper forms and information in time to be properly set up for the huge job at hand.

Consequently the issuance of "A" cards to qualified motorists having passenger cars will be accomplished on the dates of Nov. 18, 19 and 20 at the Northville grade school or at any public school in the region. Persons are asked to obtain their card at a school in their board area, and not cross board area lines as it adds to confusion and probable delay in future processing of B and C applications.

The hours for getting "A" cards at the Northville School will be from 9:30 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. of the three days and in addition from 9:30 to 11:30 a. m. on Thursday only—this time a restricted period for those who can not come in the afternoon or evening and only a limited staff will be available for the work. The work will be discussed at 2 p. m. of these three days.

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

Post-Office Prepares for Big Christmas Mailing

The Post Office Department has started the most gigantic task of its calendar—the mailing of a billion of Christmas parcels, cards and letters, which maintaining the regular flow of millions of pieces of mail daily to and from our armed forces all over the world.

As a result of the volume of Christmas mail will be the largest on record already in September, latest figures show that 100,000,000 parcels, cards and letters are being mailed to the Department of Commerce. And as the season progresses, such heavy purchases as presents, postage stamps, and other necessities are being mailed.

If thousands of our soldiers, sailors, marines and airmen are not to be disappointed at Christmas time, the public must cooperate by mailing earlier than ever before and by addressing letters and parcels properly. The best interests of a Post Office Department which cannot be enough, in view of the wartime difficulties faced by the postal system. The public must assist.

About 25,000 experienced postal workers already have taken on the war service. Arrangements are under way to add thousands of temporary personnel to postal staff, but the manpower is hard to find and unprepared. Facilities of postal plants are being expanded by the purchase of new equipment. Extra trucks are being purchased to handle the winter mail.


