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

Electricity is one of the cheapest things the housewife can buy because the price has been reduced so often and so much.

You probably haven't got an electric bill dated twenty-five years ago, but the records show that electricity cost 5.87 cents then; and now it is only 3.16 cents. Almost half price. There have been many rate reductions in twenty-five years.

Most other prices have gone up. Food, clothing, taxes, transportation. If your husband rides to work on the street car he may have heard that twenty-five years ago he could have bought seven tickets for a quarter. In 1917 the Detroit tax rate was \$13.81 — this year it is \$28.97. I used to have an "Ingersoll Dollar Watch" that kept fairly good time, but you can't get a dollar watch now. And you know how much less a \$5 bill will buy in rent, round steak or clothes.

The price of electricity is low. If other things cost as little, the cost of living would be half what it is.







the impact of total war. The War Production Board has asked city officials, civic clubs, Chambers of Commerce, merchants and citizens generally to dispense with outdoor decorative lighting this Christmas. WPB points out that Yuletide lighting requires use of critical materials, electricity and manpower and is not in line with general conservation programs already under way.

Between now and Jan. 1 the output of coal and wood-burning domestic heating stoves will be stepped up... WPB made this move to meet the acute shortage of these stoves... beginning Nov. 29 sugar rations will also be imposed for coffee, rations—stamps numbered 20 to 28 have been designated as coffee stamps... the government is preparing to take action against thousands of retailers over the nation, chiefly in the field of retailing regulations that have proved discriminatory.

Advice to Christmas shoppers from the Office of Defense Transportation: Carry your packages home with you (store delivery has been cut 25 per cent under last year), but carry them on buses and street cars during off-peak hours between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. In cases of purchases that cannot be carried, do your shopping immediately. Avoid the all-time record crush anticipated for mid-December.

To prevent a critical heating oil shortage in Lower Michigan and to insure adequate deliveries pending further study into price structures, OPA has just established new ceilings on distillate fuel oil for both tank wagon and refineries in this territory. Generally, the new ceilings are one-half cent higher per gallon.

Here's a good bunch on gasoline rationing! By properly enclosing your ration coupons at times you will avoid the inconvenience of having to go to the gas station at the service station. Also, this additional measure will help protect your ration book from possible misuse in the case of loss or theft. The Office of Price Administration points out that it is not necessary for ration holders to wait until they buy gasoline before endorsing coupons. So write your name on the back of your coupons immediately.

Boys and girls, take good care of your toys. The War Production Board has ruled that no more toys, games or repair or replacement parts for toys and games may be produced that contain certain metals and other critical war materials. Even the use of metal, plastics and cork for fishing tackle is forbidden.

To finance the war effort, the Treasury will borrow during December the unprecedented sum of approximately \$1 billion. Secretary of the Treasury, Henry Morgenthau, Jr., has announced a "Save for Victory" sales campaign on Nov. 29 on three series of offerings of new securities, with 41,000 volunteer workers soliciting subscriptions. At the same time, the war savings staff, with its 300,000 volunteers, will intensify its drive to add at least 1 million more income-earners to those already investing regularly in war bonds through the payroll savings plan.
