Congressional Comment

By Representative George A. Dondero of Michigan

Under the provisions of the Revenue Act of 1942 corporations with a normal tax net income of \$50,000 or less are subject to a tax rate schedule which ranges from 15% to 21%.

Corporation surtax net income up to \$25,000 is subject to a 10% tax. Corporation surtax net income of over \$25,000 but not over \$50,000 will be taxed at the rate of 10% for the first \$25,000 plus 22% of the amount over \$25,000.

Adjusted excess profits net income is subject to a flat 90% tax. This replaces the former graduated rates ranging from 35% to 60%.

A limitation of 30% is placed on the combined amount of corporate profits taken in the normal tax, surtax, and excessive profits tax.

Part of the excess profits tax of corporations which are taxed under the Revenue Act of 1942 is refundable after the war.

able year. To the extent so used, the current excess profits tax is reduced and the amount refundable after the war is reduced.

An annual declaration of value of capital stock is now allowed and the former requirement for redeclaration is eliminated.

In general, the foregoing rates apply to domestic corporations. Foreign corporations doing business in the United States are subject to a flat normal tax rate of 24%.

Estate Tax. In the estate tax section of the Revenue Act of 1942, the specific exemption in estates of residents or citizens of the United States is increased from \$40,000 to \$50,000.

Gift Tax. In the gift tax section, the specific exemption for gifts is reduced from \$10,000 to \$5,000.

The Monopoly State Review, a trade publication of the monopoly states, said editorially in its July 1942 issue: "Michigan appears to be more active than any other mon-

opoly state in its efforts to inform and educate the public on matters pertaining to liquor control." The policy of the state commission is expressed in these words: "The commission has repeatedly impressed its belief that expansion of this educational and research

work is essential to the control of a portion of the state's profits from

"Among the projects is an attack through education and mobilization of public opinion upon drunk driving. It also feels that the state commission properly take the lead in promoting research under scientific auspices of the methods now

being used in treatment of alcoholism to the end that we might approach European countries in the intelligence with which they treat and frequently cure alcoholics."

Will control of this type save John Barleycorn from another incarceration? Are we going back over the old

road to blind pigs and speak-easies and gangster bootlegging profits, those byproducts of the old national prohibition?

Right or wrong, the State of Michigan is today in the liquor business. It is wielding controls over profit and sale.

As war conditions grow critical, government may impose drastic controls: Rationing of liquor, limitation of the hours of sale. The alternative, as we see it, is a return to prohibition. Which would you rather have?

Will old John Barleycorn survive World War II? Here is a controversial question for 1943 when, according to a business forecast, the war is going to hit us right in the face and non-essentials will be given a crucial test of survival.

Michigan's situation might be summed up as follows: Industrial payrolls are soaring. Shelves of stores are being depleted of goods. More liquor, wine and beer are being sold today than in many a moon. The temperance forces are getting active. Liquor dealers are worried. The state government is tightening its control.

The Temperance Foundation of Michigan, an organization which succeeded to the name of the Anti-Saloon League, desires to see the actual return of prohibition through legislative county option and an educational program in the schools and churches. Many of its loyal members, headed by State Senator Earl Burhans of Paw Paw, believe the time is getting opportune for favorable action.

The alcoholic beverage industry—the firms which make and sell the stuff that cheers—is becoming apprehensive over the state's public opinion should the cause of liquor enflame the voters.

And then, contrasted to the Michigan war days in 1918, the state government at Lansing is conducting a rather militant drive to control the liquor business through an appointed three-member commission. The state's activity in 1943 may become one of the deciding factors.

The pre-war saloon, a popular target for vivid satires and indignatives, has been followed by the modern tavern where men and woman alike imbibe together, while the juke box grants recorded jazz and sentimental lyrics.

Whether the average tavern is any better or worse than the old saloon is for you to decide, and we surmise that the verdict will not be unanimous.

A new factor in today's war-time situation is the role of government action in behalf of the people, to curtail abuses and to syphon some of the profits into the public treasury. For all the liquor profits from the sale of rum may have been used to enable our home-town library to buy books of literary merit, State aid to libraries comes from the state fund. And the national fund of 1942 received more than \$100,000,000 from the state's profit in the liquor business.

Over at home, a country town in Michigan, county three (three) operators recently notified in the morning by a newspaper that customers in the town had been notified to stop drinking. The State Liquor Commission, in a letter dated in 1941, advised that just such a thing had happened in the past.

Among the war controls created by the commission were those: Encouraged preparation of passports and postpaid letters; workers to think before going to work and not to drink during their noon hours.

Carried on a military safety program to reduce the loss of manpower and automobiles, entirely needed in the war effort.

Tavern operators are urged by the state to promote the sale of war bonds and stamps. The commission also cooperated with army officers and Navy Surgeons and the state department of health in a venereal disease control program. Licensees are required to refuse admission to questionable women and are warned that their license to sell liquor may be revoked where it is found that contraction of a disease followed an acquaintance made in a tavern.

In one mid-western city the license of 13 bars were revoked because health authorities traced the source of disease to girls "picked up" at bars.

Selling beer to minors is a violation of the Michigan state law.

In Lansing, a war boom spot, a dozen or so taverns have been closed for disciplinary periods by the state because operators sold beer to minors.

Last week two taverns near East Lansing, home of Michigan State College, were denied renewal of licenses. Reason: sale of beer to students under 21.

Africa, Asia and the Far East. If anyone in Michigan traveled in peacetime and has such items, apply for a questionnaire from Col. L. E. Norris, Strategic Photos, Box 46, Station "G," New York City. The increase of fuel oil rationing in Michigan, recently announced by the Office of Price Administration, means that coupons issued to home owners for Period 3 (those numbered "3") are valued at 31 gallons instead of ten. Likewise, coupons used by department houses, office buildings and schools will take this. At the normal rate of consumption less than one month's supply of fuel oil will be on hand in this country on Jan. 1, according to War Production Board officials. Limited shipping space from South America prevents the importation of motor fuels from which that "high stuff" is made. And now we're going to get a "Victory" alarm clock. As you know, the WPB stopped production of alarm clocks along with other civilian timepieces but now a popular, priced model has been ordered. The new "Victory" clock will have a non-metal case and will be designed to use the least amount of copper and brass in peacetime parts. Mrs. Michigan likes indistinctly in an umbrella, she had better take care of the one she already owns. Umbrellas are among the latest necessities to feel the wartime pinch of shortage in steel, fabrics and manufacturing facilities. The new ones have been simplified by WPB order and are about to be standardized as to weight, number of ribs, etc. Eighteen printing plants scattered across the country are rolling in full production on War Ration Book No. 2. This book which will introduce the point rationing system to Mr. and Mrs. Michigan, will be distributed soon after the first of the year. The printing of 150 million copies is one of the biggest jobs of its kind in history. Dots and Dashes: U. S. steel production next year will approach twice the combined output of the Axis nations. The large steel expansion program should be completed by June. Lumber consumption for 1943 is estimated at approximately 2 billion board feet, compared with 40 billion feet in 1942. Michigan fruit and vegetable growers and shippers are urged to stock up on used wooden boxes, crates, baskets and barrels for next year. The telegraph industry will abandon its special services to customers but low rate messages may still go to members of the armed services. One million ceramic fireproof safes have been made for installation in American homes, thus saving 30,000 tons of cast iron. Gas fired and oil burning water heaters have been added to the list of products which will be manufactured next year only for use in housing or other war projects. The maximum price for chili con carne, julienne potatoes and shoestring potatoes have been set at the November 1942 levels. Because of time difference, our boys in the Solomon will be celebrating the incoming New Year when it is noon of Dec. 31 in Michigan. Final date for obtaining War Ration Book No. 1 (good for coffee and sugar) has been postponed from Dec. 15 to Jan. 15 due to "weather con-

ditions," transportation problems and heavy work loads at many Board offices." Book I will be necessary to obtain Book II at a future date, not yet announced.

If you eat more than 14 meals a week at a restaurant or boarding house you're supposed to surrender your ration book to the owner or manager. Sugar regulations said 12 meals a week; coffee regulations, 14. A new Office of Price Administration amendment has ended the inconsistency by making it 14.

Supplies of the new, now valid, will be good for three pounds of sugar until Jan. 31, 1943.

Dry edible beans will be a national Victory Food Special from Jan. 18 through Jan. 22.

Despite the Army and Navy's traditional liking for beans, supplies on hand are the greatest in history.

Lately, addition to dehydrated foods for troops overseas is rice pudding, made from pre-cooked rice, processed raisins, sugar, salt, spices and vanilla flavoring. Add water and you have a good old dish of American "kitchen-house" favorite.

The OPA has done something now about the banana supply, now down to 25 per cent of normal, but it's a "price control" step, not a "production" one. Clothing rationing appears to be off for the time being. A cheering note from the OPA is this: "Government makers are planning to produce just about as many dresses and suits for spring as they did last year, when the number was ample. A series of price orders will make it possible for far-seeing shoppers to start figuring their clothes budgets for next spring, always providing they remember what they paid last spring!"

Increased size of the Army and Navy's great-eating priorities, of Great Britain and Russia is the chief reason behind the announced cut in per capita meat consumption for Americans from 2 1/2 pounds to 33 ounces. The Office of War Information pointed out. More than 89 per cent of our year's supply of beef, veal, lamb and mutton have been kept right here at home for use of our civilian population or sent to our own armed forces here or abroad, OWT figures show. Thirteen per cent of the pork supply was exported to the Allies.

Brazil is speeding rubber gatherers toward the Amazon Valley after signing an agreement with the United States to supply 50,000 tons in 1942. Canada has banned liquor advertising and curtailed the manufacture of beer and liquor.

Americans will have 15 per cent less food fats and oils under 1943 rationing. It is estimated by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics.
