





war time, of daylight saving statutes, would result in serious detriment to war production, and that enactment of state legislation to change war time would have the same detrimental effect.

Organized labor leaders protested to President Roosevelt against what they called the rise in the cost of living while they said wages remained stationary. William Green and Philip Murray told reporters they complained particularly against the War Labor Board's "Little Steel Formula" for granting wage increases.

Britain's farm labor shortage may be solved by putting Italian war prisoners captured in South Africa to work on the farm lands in England, Robert St. Hubson, War Labor Board member, said today.

The Treasury urged prompt enactment of pay-as-you-go tax legislation to provide a 45 per cent withholding tax, but that opposed Rural plan to stop one sort of tax liability.

Nationwide adoption of the six-day week in the bituminous coal mining industry was urged by Harold Ickes who said that with most of the mines working on a five-day week the industry was unable to meet current demands.

The Army wants the Government to requisition some 7,000,000 of the 27,950,000 automobiles in the country and all spare tires, on passenger cars, a House committee was told by Robert W. Patterson.

John I. Lewis, United Mine Workers' chairman, called together the U. M. W. Policy Committee to launch a drive to crack the War Labor Board's "Little Steel" wage formula and obtain a "substantial" increase for \$9,000,000.

A county-by-county survey of the farm labor supply will be started promptly, a senate investigating committee was informed, to determine the nature and extent of the labor shortage in the farm lands.

Farm help from soldiers was the warning of Agricultural Minister Robert S. Hodson to farmers at Madison, Kent, who added "I want you to take this warning seriously."

Price Administrator Brown asserted "there is no doubt in my judgment as to either the necessity or the legality" of the prohibition against pleasure driving in the 47 Eastern States. Mr. Brown made the statement in a telegram to OPA Regional Administrators in Boston, New York, Cleveland and Atlanta.

The War Department made public details of its plan to induct most of the enlisted reservists in colleges at the end of the current semester. The plan, which would induct students in the enlisted reserve will not be put into effect until the conclusion of the first semester beginning in 1942.

Secretary of Commerce Jones announced that the Defense Plant Corporation had contracted for 200,000 steel drums with a capacity of 55 gallons each for use in transporting fuel oil and kerosene in freight cars from the Gulf Coast to the Atlantic Seaboard.

Premier Tojo declared that "Japan will fight to the end to crush America's war effort." He said that "Japan has no territorial ambitions toward the United States or South America."

Plans for a balachone plant at Wood River, Ill., have been canceled. Col. Richard D. Rivers, Deputy Director, developed, because the shortage of certain components was the first consolidation of a synthetic rubber project.

Wages in the rubber industry are being held for an almost certain clash with government price controls, announced a demand for a 52-cent day pay increase in the bituminous industry effective April 1.
