COUPONS—No. 4 "A" coupons are valid for four gallons each until March 21.

and "C" coupons expire according to the dates indicated on the coupons. "B" coupons are issued by local rationing boards after the expiration of "A" coupons.

for "B" and "C" book holders to Feb. 23. Drivers who have had their tires inspected are urged by the local OPA to do so to avoid last-minute rushes.

"B" and "C" book drivers with more than 1,000 essential miles per month are eligible for Grade 1. Applicants must first have their tires inspected at local stations and must present statements showing the need for replacement.

SALE OF POINT RATIONED CANNED GOODS—Sale of point rationed canned goods and red-bleeding machines is frozen until March 1. Presentation of ration books from War Ration Book No. 2 them will be necessary with each purchase.

shoe exchanges where mothers of growing children can be expected to be an outcome of shoe rationing. For most of the time the neighbors will be more convenient than going to the local rationing board to get an extra shoe purchase.

This list handy: these are not rationed: Soft and hard-soled

house slippers and house slippers. Infants soft-soled shoes. Canvas shoe shoes with type soles. Rubber slippers. Canvas waterproof rubber footwear. Including rubber mitts. Gaiters. Rubber.

If you have a rationed watch you're not using for essential purposes, the Government asks you to sell it to the local rationing board or report it to the watch and clock unit of W.R.C.

Many railroad employees going into service took their watches with them. Now there is an acute shortage in these exact time pieces necessary for the operation of today's heavily-laden and closely-scheduled railroads.

A new OPA method of controlling prices of butter is expected to result in as much as a 11-cent-a-pound drop in the consumer in some areas, where there has been going. Special orders and extra mark-up prices have been the result of the new method of distribution from the time it leaves the creamery.

Federal Administrator Harold L. Ickes has just about guessed the hopes that come spring, the pleasure driving man will be fitted in the East. More likely, he indicates, it may be extended to the whole country to save oil as well as rubber stocks. With 100-octane gas and all-terrain machines playing a bigger and bigger part in the United Nations take the offensive, more and more World War II is becoming a war of oil.

Bread sales have jumped considerably since the government's rationing edict, but that doesn't bother officials, who point that the United States still has plenty of wheat but no steel to repair or replace bread-slicing machines. Besides, they believe consumption will fall off, once bread-slicing technique is improved.

No special provision has been made in the rationed goods rationing program for vegetables though their plight has been studied. Chances are they will have to be rationed, just as much as big meat eaters—such as steel workers and ditch diggers.

Leaves, children and adults all will get the same meat allowance when the rationing plan goes into effect, now expected about the 28th of March. Officials of the OPA said that they had failed to find any sensible or workable plan of graduating meat rations according to age, and are making final plans on the basis of everyone getting the same amount.

Housewives aren't turning in as much fat or as many tin cans as the government would like. Defining and checking rationing could take care of tin cans as many tin cans are now collected each month says W.P.B. Chief Donald M. Nelson. "If every housewife in the nation saved as little as one tablespoonful of waste fats each day, the total would produce an amount of glycerine for our own forces and those of our allies," says Paul C. Cabot, Director W.P.B. Salvage Division.

Ration books of children who were 14 when the books were issued may be used to buy coffee, effective Feb. 29. At present, ration books cannot be used for coffee unless the holder was 15 at the time the book was issued.

Prices paid to farmers for milk to be resold as fluid milk were pegged to parity last week, but last month's individual peak price.

"B" and "C" gas ration rations may now be obtained by mail rather than appearing personally before local War Price and Rationing Boards.

The Department of Agriculture wants victory gardeners to clearly understand it has no objection either for sale or for free distribution of a list of victory garden fertilizers sponsored by the Department and W.P.B. can be bought at your favorite garden store.

NATIONAL NEWS EVENTS

The War Manpower Commission announced a list of 51 additional colleges and universities approved for use by the War and Navy Departments for specialized war training programs, supplementing the group of 238 schools announced earlier.

In a step designed to reduce absenteeism the House Naval Committee wrote into a minor bill an amendment to require all Navy Yards to file with the local selective service board the name of each civilian employee who has been absent from work without prior authorization.

The Agricultural Department asked Congress to appropriate \$65,975,000 for farm labor battalions, the money to be used to transport farm laborers and handle other expenses incidental to shifts.

Mr. Wickard told Senators investigating food production he would ask the Army to furnish troops to help with this year's crop harvest "if the necessity arises."

A joint appeal to income taxpayers to make their first payments promptly despite current discussions of pay-as-you-go proposals was made by Treasury Secretary Morgenthau.

Even occupational deferment must yield to the armed services requirements for specially skilled men, Manpower Commissioner McNutt said in a press conference.

After the military training for all American youths would be made compulsory for one year between the ages of 18 and 21 under bills introduced in the House and Senate.

Secretary of the Interior Ickes asked coal miners and operators to expedite negotiations for new wage agreements in order to avoid possible interruption of production.

Canada and the United States jointly announced a simplification of border crossing regulations which will exempt Canadians and British citizens (really resident of Canada from the need of obtaining passports for visits of less than 30 days.

A plan for cancellation of half 1942 individual taxes was reported proposed by Chairman Dougherty of the House Ways and Means Committee as a preliminary to pay-as-you-go taxation.

The Marine Corps began recruiting candidates for its women's reserve, the newest of the service auxiliaries, Maj. Ruth Glick director heads the organization.

Lowering of the voting age from 21 to 18 in Georgia has been approved 70 to 0 in the Senate. Gov. Ellis Arnall said it is the first such legislative action in the United States. The House must concur with the Senate for the proposed constitutional amendment to be submitted to popular vote.

United States attorneys filed criminal informations in Detroit's Federal Court against 11 persons accused of selling and buying new automobile tires in "black market." Several of the defendants named were listed as purchasers, including three residents of Cleveland, Ohio.

Wage negotiations between representatives of railroads and 20,000 members of the operating Brotherhoods were terminated without agreement and the services of the National (railway) Mediation Board were invoked by both sides.

A Philadelphia draft board with supervision over a district heavily populated with Navy Yard employees announced that draft-eligible war workers found to be habitually absent from their employment will be penalized and given I-A status.

The Government put a ceiling on the height of heels for women's shoes, ruled out leather-covered platform effects, and restricted shoe colors to four—black, white, Army russet and tan.

At the same time it banned leather frills, men's patent leather shoes, women's formal evening slippers and metal-spiked golf shoes.

There are no present plans to ration clothing, Donald M. Nelson said following reports from the War Relocation Authority that there had been runs in clothing due to fear that rationing was imminent.

Allegations that the United States has proposed or signed an agreement with rubber-producing countries in South America calling for dismantling of synthetic rubber plants in the United States after the war were resorted as entirely unfounded by State Department officials in Washington.
