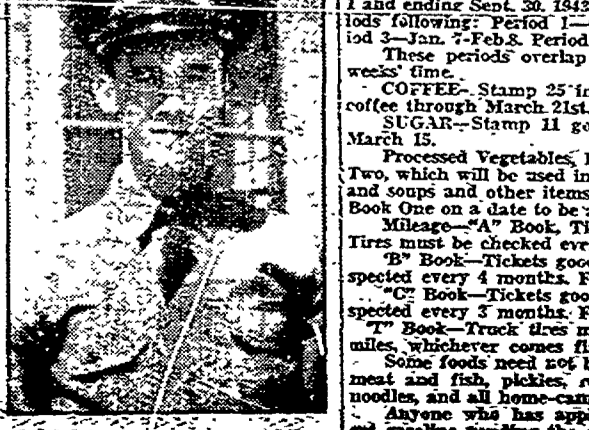

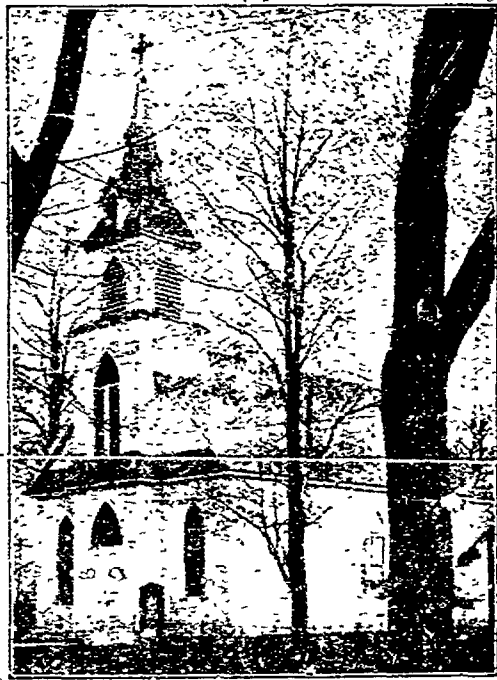

front porch. What else can you get today for 3 cents a week and delivered too? An increase to \$2 a year, or from \$2 to \$2.50 a year is less than a penny a week. It may mean the difference between a newspaper surviving in your community or suspending forever. Daily newspapers, likewise are adjusting their circulation rates. Readers are paying a larger share of the cost of producing a newspaper, much of which heretofore has been borne by the advertisers. Out of this will come better edited newspapers, streamlined in news content. Fewer bulky sections will follow. Hereafter Radio is licensed by the government, your newspaper is not. That alone is worth an additional penny a week, or even five pennies a week if your newspaper is published daily.

Farm Labor: High school students, women and townspeople may be called next fall to harvest Michigan's 1943 war crop. Michigan State College is inaugurating a six-week training course for farm youth selected by the farm security administration of the United States department of Agriculture. Boys recruited for farm service will be drafted exempt and will remain on the "food front" for the duration. As this column has hinted before, Washington is gradually releasing news of the serious food shortage. Last year we consumed and exported more food than we produced and the 1942 growing season was unusually favorable. Have you planned your Victory Garden yet?

INCOME OF FARMERS

Under the accrual basis in which inventories are used to determine the profits, farmers' gross profits are ascertained by adding to the inventory value of livestock and produce on hand at the end of the year the amount received from the sale of livestock and produce during the year and deducting from this sum the inventory value of livestock and produce on hand at the beginning of the year and the cost of livestock and produce purchased during the year. All livestock and produce purchased must be included in inventory at their proper valuation. Livestock acquired for draft, breeding or dairy purposes and not for sale may be included in the inventory and of the value of capital assets subject to depreciation, reduced such practice is consistently followed.

Over time: When the Federal War Reloading Act was first introduced in Congress, sponsors declared it was needed because of the depression which had been caused by the war. The act was passed in 1918 and was amended in 1920. It provided for the payment of 40 hours for workers in certain critical war areas, and the reason given was that the country was in a state of emergency. It is now being considered for re-authorization.


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

and Rationing Board. Coupons sufficient for his needs will be issued for the first and second three-month period at the same time.

COUPONS—No. 4 "A" coupons are valid for four gallons each for March 21.

and "C" coupons expire according to the dates indicated on the ration book. "B" coupons are issued by local rationing boards after the ration book is issued from local Offices of Defense Transportation at the time of the rationing board.

INSPECTION—Reading for "A" coupons for "B" and "C" book holders to Feb. 23. Drivers who have had their tires inspected are urged by the local OPA to do so to avoid last-minute rushes.

Drivers are eligible to obtain certificates for reroading or for replacement tires. "B" and "C" book drivers with less than 100 miles per month may obtain certificates for Grade 2 tires. Motorists with more than 1,000 essential miles per month are eligible for Grade 1. Applicants must first have their tires inspected at local stations and must present statements showing the need for replacement.

RESERVED FOODS—Sale of point rationed canned goods and reserving items to consumers is frozen until March 1. Presentation of ration book No. 2 will be necessary with each ration book.

Shoe exchanges where mothers of growing children can expect to be an outcome of shoe rationing. For most communities the neighbors will be more convenient than going to the local rationing board to get an extra shoe purchase.

This list handy: these are not rationed: Soft and hard-soled

leaves slippers and hosiery slippers. Infants soft-soled shoes. Canvas top shoes with rope laces. Rubber slippers. Genuine waterproof rubber footwear, including rubber boots. Gaiters. Rubbers.

If you have a rationed watch you're not using for essential purposes, the Government asks you to sell it to the local rationing board or report it to the watch and clock unit of W.P.C.

Many railroad employees going into service took their watches with them. Now there is an acute shortage in these exact time pieces necessary for the operation of today's heavily-laden and closely-scheduled railroads.

A new OPA method of controlling prices of butter is expected to result in as much as a 11-cent-a-pound drop in the consumer in some areas, where there has been a long period of high prices.

Special orders and extra minimum prices will be necessary to insure a steady state of butter distribution from the time it leaves the creamery.

Federal Administrator Harold L. Ickes has just announced the hope that come spring, the pleasure driving ban will be lifted in the East. More likely, he indicates, it may be extended to the whole country to save oil as well as rubber stocks. With 100-octane gas and oil-powered machines playing a bigger and bigger part in the United Nations' plan for the offensive, more and more World War II is becoming a war of oil.

Bread sales have jumped considerably since the government's rationing diet, but that doesn't bother officials, who point that the United States still has plenty of wheat but no steel to repair or replace bread-slicing machines. Besides, they believe consumption will fall off, once bread-slicing techniques are improved.

No special provision has been made in the rationed goods rationing program for vegetables though their plight has been studied. Chances are they will have to be rationed as much as big meat eaters such as steel workers and ditch diggers.

Leaves, children and adults all will get the same meat allowance when the rationing plan goes into effect on Feb. 28. At present, ration books cannot be used for coffee unless the holder was 15 at the time the book was issued.

Prices paid to farmers for milk to be resold as fluid milk were pegged to parity last month but last month's individual peak price.

"B" and "C" gas ration reroading may now be obtained by mail rather than appearing personally before local War Price and Rationing Boards.

The Department of Agriculture wants victory gardeners to clearly understand it has no special offer for fertilizer. For most of the year fertilizer is sold by the Department and W.P.C. can be bought at your favorite garden store.
