FARM FAMILIES TO RECEIVE WAR SERVICE CERTIFICATES

Farm families who have entered in the huge 1943 food production program will be awarded a Certificate of Farm War Service in recognition of their war work. The certificate, signed by Secretary of Agriculture, will be presented by County WPA-War Boards after the completion of the 1943 farm mobilization drive. The 1943 farm plan which each farm operator files out will be the basis for making awards.

City-suburban and farm women will all be needed to do nine general types of farm work. They are: poultry, dairy, pigs, beef cattle and sheep production and work in the gardens, fields, truck gardens and general farm work. Each is broken down to specific jobs.

Secretary Wickard has asked all governors to provide for training youths (14 years and older) from schools in areas where they are needed to help with spring planting.


