**NO INSTALLATIONS can be made in some sections**  
 UNDER an order of the War Production Board, telephone installations can be made hereafter only on a conditional basis. The order requires that an applicant agree to share his line with others, or to relinquish his service entirely, if the facilities are needed later for vital war or other essential purposes.  
 In some places, no installations can be made because the facilities are being used to capacity and critical material shortages prevent expansion of the telephone system.  
 These and other wartime restrictions will inconvenience many persons, we know. However, we shall continue to supply service whenever possible, and we look forward to the day when we again can give all the service wanted, when and where wanted.

OFFICIAL OPA INFORMATION
Beginning March 29 these foods will be rationed: fresh, frozen, cured, smoked and
canned beef, veal, pork, lamb, mutton and all meat products derived from them
including all variety meats such as liver, heart, kidney, brains, sweetbreads and
all sausage. All canned fish, in glass or tin. All cheese and its derivatives except
cheeses such as cottage, cream, bleu, and Liederkranz. All butter, lard, margarine,
shortening, salad and cooking oils, except mayonnaise and salad dressings.

to get meat...

other foods rationed
under this program
AS A FARMER OR
PRODUCER
The farmer's position in the Red Stamp rationing program is unique. In all cases,
he is a consumer, but he may also be a slaughterer, a wholesaler and a retailer.
Each classification and activity is governed by special regulations. You will be
expected to know what these regulations are so read carefully the information
given below.
FARMERS WHO SLAUGHTER their own
livestock for their own consumption, or for
storage at home or elsewhere (to be eventu-
ally consumed by their own family), do not
have to surrender ration stamps. Farmers
who purchase rationed foods must give up
stamps, just as any other consumer.
FARMERS WHO SELL or barter meat
they have slaughtered must first obtain a
slaughter permit from their County Agri-
cultural War Board. Permit numbers must
appear on all wholesale cuts of meat sold
or bartered.
POINT VALUE CHARTS for both whole-
sale and retail sales as well as the necessary
report forms may be obtained from County
Agricultural War Boards. Do not hesitate
to call upon your Ration Board or local
OPA office for any additional information.

A MACHINE gun firing 1200 shells per minute requires mass production on a big scale to keep it supplied with ammunition.



Starting with a steel strip, the stock feeds through multiple stamping machines to make the "green" link (not yet heat treated). Then on a continuous conveyor belt, the links go successively to electric furnaces for hardening, to shot blasting machines, to draw furnaces for more heat treating, to a rust preventive bath, and finally to bins where every link is tested for strength and accurate dimensions.
