Zoning Election Will Be Held On Tuesday, June 1

Voters of Community Will Have Opportunity to Express Their Wishes at Polls Open Till 8

Northville Village will vote on the proposed Zoning Ordinance as passed by the Village Commission at a special election Tuesday, June 1.

The two usual voting places will be manned for the election at 100th the Village hall and the Scout building during the usual hours until eight o'clock in the evening. The question as set forth on the ballot reads as follows: Shall the Zoning Ordinance as passed by the Village Commission on March 16th, 1943, be adopted?

After many public hearings and the passing of the ordinance, the special election was called on the petition of the required number of voters as set up in the Village Charter.

Three Northville High School alumni to receive college degrees this commencement season are Lucille Lapham, Mary Geraghty and Stewart Benjamin Duguid.

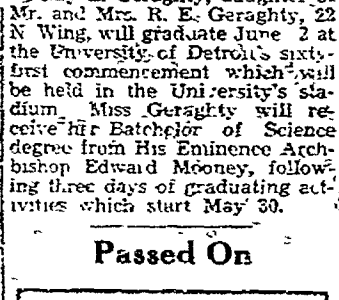

Editor Eaton Compliments Northville on Zoning Project

Within the next few days the beautiful village of Northville will vote on the question of whether it shall have a zoning ordinance or permit its present but-and-miss system of expansion to continue.

Northville for years and years has been regarded as one of the most beautiful communities of the state. Because of the fact that it is the only place in Wayne county built amid attractive hills and dales, it has been called the "Switzerland of Wayne county."

It has more advantages for a scenic standpoint than most cities and villages of the state. It has been a progressive, prosperous and cordial community.

Now, like every other community in this part of the state, it stands on the threshold of an overnight expansion that calls for quick and positive action to save all that it has built up by hard, tedious work in the years gone by.

Plymouth a while ago faced the same problem. It protected itself by the adoption of a zoning ordinance. And today it is beautiful if there is a person in this city who would vote to repeal that ordinance.

Livonia township, and Romulus township have faced the same problem as did Plymouth. They met it with an up-to-date and progressive zoning ordinance.

Plymouth township, that section which lies around the city of Plymouth, within the next two or three weeks, will be operating under a zoning ordinance that has just been prepared.

While it is true that a zoning ordinance is chiefly beneficial to the community as a whole and home owners, it reacts to the benefit of those who read as well. It aids in the protection of the place in which they live and rear their children.

Time has proved that every argument used against the adoption of a zoning law in Plymouth was unfounded. Time has proved that any so-called injustice in the ordinance can easily be remedied after its adoption. And time has proved that Plymouth took a long step forward when it enacted its zoning law.

We are glad to see that our progressive and friendly neighbors to the north has in mind the adoption of a zoning ordinance. Anything that helps Northville helps Plymouth. And anything that helps Plymouth helps Northville. Let's keep this part of Wayne county the most desirable section of Wayne county. This can be done by taking such progressive steps as are now proposed in Northville. —Plymouth Mail.

Application for Ration Book 3 In Mail Here

Suggestions and Instructions are Presented to Prevent Errors

Mail After June 1

The Post Office offers the following suggestions to aid you in filling out applications for War Ration Book 3 accurately, based on the errors that have been made on cards that have already been returned where they were delivered before being distributed here.

The application cards for War Ration Book No. 3 are being mailed out from the Northville Post Office Thursday and Friday of this week to every household in this community. They must be properly filled out and mailed by some time between June 1 and June 10.

First, read the instructions carefully. Second, place a three-cent stamp only, in the square marked "Put postage stamp here. Do not put a stamp on the reverse side of the card in the box of instructions ending: Affix postage before mailing. Third, be sure to sign the application at the bottom of the card on line Signature of applicant or authorized agent. The signature of only one person is required here. Mail the application in some time between June 1 and June 10.

N.H.S. Places Third in League Track Meet

Northville High School athletes placed third in the combination track and physical fitness meet at Redford Union last Friday, when six of the seven schools belonging to the Oakland Western League were represented.

Northville was unable to participate in the track meet since N. H. S. has no organized track team this year, but under the leadership of Mr. Lockman the local boys placed and Nageb Postwa was high with 10 points. Nagel succeeded in winning first place in the rope climb, and the obstacle race. Other boys who placed are Slater, third place in "push-ups," Miller, third place in the rope climb, and Hunter, third place in the bar dips. Northville had a total of 19 points which set them in third place.

Regulations Are Changed For Sending Overseas Mail

Postmaster Venatta announced that regulations regarding sending packages to soldiers overseas have been changed. A written request from a soldier is still necessary and must be presented at the post office when mailing a package overseas, but it no longer has to be signed by an officer. A larger package is now accepted too. It can weigh up to five pounds and measure 36 inches in combined length and girth. Only one package can be sent in any given week by any one sender to any one soldier.

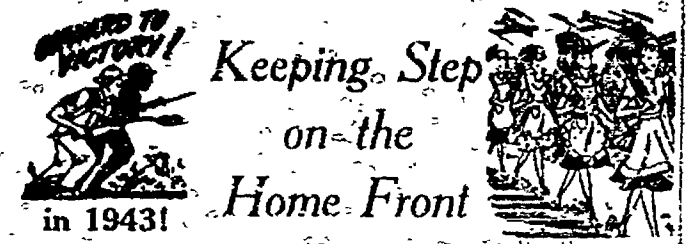

Keeping Step on the Home Front

Essential Dates and Information Affecting the Welfare of the "Vanishing Civilian"

This is a regular weekly feature designed to aid you in your current purchases of items rationed by the government. This news paper believes this service will enable individuals to cooperate more fully in winning the war on the home front.

SHOES—Stamp 17 in War Ration Book One is good for one pair of shoes until June 15. Stamps may be interchanged among members of one family.

FUEL OIL—Stamp No. 5 good until Sept. 30, 1943. Auxiliary applications for fuel oil must be made on proper form and sent to the Rationing Board for your area. Applications for 1943-44 fuel oil rations will be mailed to present users in approximately the same amounts as was granted in the original ration last fall. Owners need not prove non-convertibility for household heating rations.

COFFEE—Stamp No. 23 becomes valid for one pound Apr. 25 through May 30.

SUGAR—Stamp 12 good for five pounds from Mar. 16 through May 31. Coupon No. 13 valid June 1st for 5 pounds through Aug. 15. Coupons No. 15 and 16 became good May 24 for 5 lbs. each for home canning purposes.

SUGAR FOR CANNING—Sugar for home-canning of 1943 fruit crops will be available to housewives on approximately the same basis as last season. No reduction of blue point stamps will be made from War Ration Book Two for canning sugar. Details of the program will be issued within the next few days.

Coupon for sugar for home canning available at local ration board on and after May 15.

MEATS, FATS, CHEESE, ETC.—Red Stamp E. F. G. H. remain valid through May. Red Stamp J. becomes valid May 23rd. Red stamps from War Ration Book Two, which are good for the purchase of meats and cheeses and edible fats and oils and canned fish, will expire as follows:

Week Beginning: Red Stamp Bearing Letter: Stamp Expires

May 16: H—(16 points): May 30

May 23: K—(16 points): May 30

May 30: L—(16 points): May 30

Points are based on the following: Prunes and raisins were dropped from 20 to 12 points; dry beans, peas and lentils were reduced from 8 to 4 points per pound.

PROCESSED FOODS—Blue stamps G. H. J. remain valid thru May.

GASOLINE—No. 5 Coupon valid May 22 to July 21st.

"B" Book—Tickets good until date on ration card. Tickets must be inspected every 4 months. "C" Book Tickets good until date on ration card. Tickets must be inspected every 3 months.

"T" Book—Truck tires must be checked every 2 months or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first.

GAS RENEWALS—Renewal requests for "B" or "C" gasoline coupons may be made by mail. Blanks may be obtained at the Record office. Fill in the application (making it consistent with your original application) the year fire inspection sheet to the application and mail to Rationing Board, Plymouth, Michigan. New coupons will be mailed to you. You need not surrender your present "B" or "C" book until requested to do so by the Board issuing the new book to you.

BOARD HOURS—The Plymouth Rationing Board No. 33-82-19 is open six days a week from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. except Wednesday afternoon when the office is closed to the public in order to keep up on clerical work. Thursday night office is open until 8:30 p.m. People in Oakland County may contact their board at branch office in South Lyon, Farmington and Walled Lake or at the main office in Pontiac.

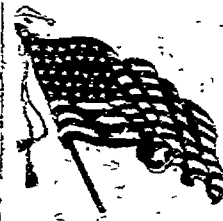

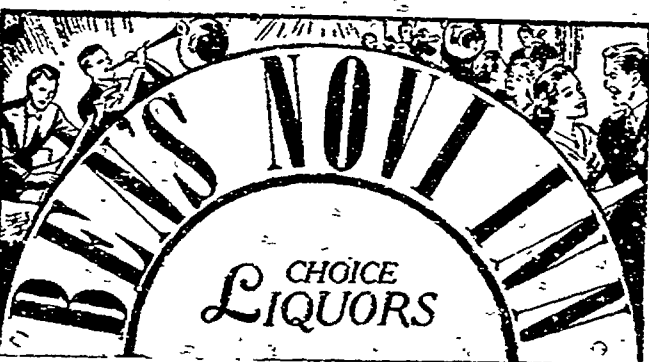

Dr. C. S. Gorseline of Battle
Creek.

With Floyd Northrop's passing,
Northville lost a prominent vil-
lager who had been active in
community affairs through the
years. For several terms he was
Northville township supervisor,

and for twelve years was a mem-
ber of the Northville Wayne
County Fair Association. During
this time he served the associa-
tion in several capacities: direct-
or, secretary and manager. He
served as a member of the board
of directors of Deposter, State
Bank until his health caused him
to retire in January, 1942.

Mr. Northrop was a past master
of the Northville Lodge No.
186, F. and A. M., as was his
father, Beech Northrop, before
him. He was also a life member
of the lodge. He was a valued
member of the Rotary Club.

Mr. Northrop was born on the
