Dondero Reviews War Conditions

17th District Congressman Talks Interestingly to Large Group at Wednesday Luncheon

Wednesday noon Congressman George A. Dondero, of the 17th Congressional district, Michigan, was the guest speaker before the combined meetings of the Exchange and Rotary clubs, and some twenty-five guests assembled at the Methodist Church House.

Mr. Dondero was introduced by W. A. Ely of Northville. Mr. Dondero reviewed the progress of the war in the two theatres of operations, Europe and Far Eastern, bringing out the records and achievements registered for the Allies since a year ago when he spoke here. He also discussed the problems of Russia and the influence of the Russian front on the decisions to be arrived at in the near future. He indulged in Washington predictions when congress adjourned and pointed to the hard struggle yet ahead before victory could be reasonably assured.

As usual the large group of citizens present were more than pleased with the intimate facts and predictions, and the tale of the gasoline situation, as told by their congressman in such an interesting manner.

Children Are Back in School; 799 Register

Northville Schools Opening With Large Enrollment And Half Day Session Wednesday

Teachers Meet

Supt. American and Principal Harrison welcomed one short of 800 students to the Northville schools on the first day of school, Wednesday, Sept. 6. Steven hundred and ninety-nine pupils were enrolled that day. This is 50 fewer enrollments than last year's total which was 749. Few hundred of these are enrolled in the grade school and the others, 399 in the high school, as against 275 in the g. ad school last year and 474 in the high school.

Enrollment figures in the grade school are as follows: kindergarten, 54; first grade, 67; second grade, 65; third grade, 56; fourth grade, 60; fifth grade, 54; sixth grade, 59.

Memorial Hall Fund Drive to Open Next Week

Solicitation To Start With Mail Campaign First of Week, and Follow-up During the Period

Make a Pledge

Next Monday marks the opening of the local campaign to raise funds for the remodelling of the former Neal property on North Center street for a home for the servicemen past, present and future of Northville and vicinity.

During the last two months architects have gone over the building and drawn plans and specifications for the project to make this property the Veterans' Memorial Hall. Several meetings have enlisted the enthusiastic support of a large number of local people in planning the project, approving the working plans of the building and its reconstruction, and also the plan of raising the necessary funds by popular subscription.

Last week the local Post and the Auxiliary moved their belongings to the village hall where temporary quarters have been set up pending a better day when the new home may be used.

Commission Has Busy Session

Reports Received, Health, Sewer and Wages Conditions Adjusted. Funds Balance is Given

The Village Commission in regular session Tuesday evening heard an appeal of Legionnaires for funds for the Memorial Hall. Bond bills, heard reports of the Chief of Police and Village Treasurer, discussed sewer problems, extended time for paying taxes, raised labor wages and heard a request for tax service.

The Veterans Memorial Hall Building Committee requested the village to authorize a plea for \$500.00 to be placed on the ballot for voter approval.

Treasurer Clarke reported total balances in the treasury of \$62,668.85, made up of fund balances as follows: General, \$33,122.98; Water, \$9,304.44; Sinking Fund, \$17,933.54; Paving, \$1856.93; and Fire, \$366.96. Upon re-commission of Mr. Clarke the commission authorized the investment of \$15,000.00 in the 3rd War Loan and extended the final date for village taxes to Oct. 15, over 75% of the taxes being already paid.

Sanitary conditions and logs in the village called for a recommendation from the Health Officer.

Chief Rodcker reported that during August 23 violations of traffic laws, 19 summonses, \$30.00 in fines, 1 accident, 2 robberies, and 2 persons bitten by dogs, 5 drunks given the golden rule treatment, and 107 calls. Ten doors were found open in the business section.

The Austin Co. of Plymouth asked the privilege of extending its service to Northville. Hourly rates for labor were raised from 70c to 80c. The master of dramatics asked for further confirmation of the shut

Gift Subscriptions For Men Overseas

Postal authorities have for a period of thirty days set aside the requirement that newspaper subscriptions to army personnel overseas must be confirmed by a request in writing from the addressee, endorsed by his commanding officer. The army authorities now realize that hometown newspapers are what most soldiers want. The ban never did apply to men in the navy and marine corps.

Publishers are now permitted to accept subscriptions between September 15 and October 15 without a letter or an authorization from the soldier overseas. The 30-day period being fixed for (Continued on back page)

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

Wartime hints worth knowing:

How to save ELECTRICITY



without sacrificing needed
LIGHT

With fall evenings just around the corner, the matter of home lighting becomes doubly important. In many homes there will be increased demands for longer hours of eyework—extra studying, sewing and other seeing tasks. Fortunately, it is possible to make your present lamps and fixtures do double duty... and to save electricity without sacrificing needed light.

Here are a few practical suggestions: (1) Fitting dark-colored lamp shades with white linings can increase the amount of light from the lamp by as much as 50%. Use good white paper and fasten seam with Scotch tape. (2) Clean lamp bulbs and reflectors frequently. Dust and dirt may rob you of half the light you pay for. (3) Flaring lamp shades do a better job of spreading light than straight-sided shades. The wider the opening at top and bottom the more useful light is directed into the room. (4) Whenever possible, make floor and table lamps serve more than one person for reading or sewing. A single lamp on a table, for example, can provide light for chairs on both sides of it. 



Section 58 of the Current Tax

Payment Act of 1943 which be-

came law on June 9, 1943, re-

quires that certain persons shall

make declarations of estimated in-

come and tax on September 15,

1943, and the persons designated

as being required to file such de-

clarations are:

1. Single persons subject to the withholding tax whose income

for 1942 was reasonably be-

pected to exceed \$2,700 or did exceed that amount in 1942.

2. Married persons, living with

husband or wife, subject to the

withholding tax whose income

for 1942 was reasonably be-

pected to exceed \$3,500 or did exceed that amount in 1942.

3. Single and married persons

subject to the withholding tax

with gross income from sources

other than wages which can

reasonably be expected to ex-

ceed \$700 in 1943 or did exceed

that amount in 1942 and an in-

come tax was required to be

paid or would have been re-

quired if the marital status had

been the same.

4. Persons whose gross income

for 1942 was greater than the gross income that can reasonably

be expected in 1943.

5. Persons whose income is de-

rived from sources not subject to the withholding tax such as self-employed persons and business

and professional men, and such income can reasonably be ex-

pected to total \$800; if single, or

\$1,200 if married.

In order to attain reasonably

accurate advance estimates of

income, the law imposes a 6%

interest penalty on substantial

overestimates. A tolerance of

20% is allowed without

penalty. Taxpayers who find

that they have underestimated

their income by more than 20%

may file an amended declaration

on December 15, 1943, and adjust

the tax difference.

The filing of an estimate of in-

come declaration on September 15, 1943, is not in lieu of the regu-

lar income tax return required

on March 15, 1944. All persons

whose gross income is sufficient

to require a return must file

such a return showing his actual

1943 income on March 15, 1944.

Under the provisions of the Current Tax Payment Act, the installments which you paid on March 15, 1943, and on June 15, 1943, will be credited toward your 1943 tax liability as finally determined by your return on March 15, 1944.

There will be a 75% abate-

ment on your 1942 or 1943 lia-

bility, whichever is less. If your

tax liability for the lesser year


