The minutes of said meeting fully describing said sections of road are hereby made a part of this notice, and are as follows:

"Minutes of the meeting of the Board of County Road Commissioners of the County of Wayne held at 3200 Barium Tower, Detroit, Michigan, at 10:00 a.m., Friday, September 23, 1943.

Present: Commissioners O'Brien and Brown.

Commissioner Brown moved the adoption of the following resolution:

WHEREAS, all that part of Longtin Avenue, 30 feet wide, (formerly Huron Avenue), extending southerly from the north line of Lot 42 produced westerly, to the northerly line of Leroy Avenue, (formerly Grove Avenue); also all that part of Seiwyn Avenue, 60 feet wide, extending southerly from a line joining the southeast corner of Lot 391 and the southwest corner of Lot 492 to the northerly line of Leroy Avenue, (formerly Grove Avenue); also all of Cherry Avenue, 60 feet wide, except that portion of Cherry Avenue included in the intersection with Dix Avenue, also all of Orchard Avenue, 60 feet wide, except that portion of Orchard Avenue, 60 feet wide, lying in the rear of lots 42 to 103 inclusive, and Lots 104 to 210 inclusive; also all of the public alley, 20 feet wide, lying in the rear of lots 104 to 130 inclusive, also all of the public alley, 18 feet wide, lying in the rear of lots 131 to 194 inclusive; also all that part of the public alley, 10 feet wide, lying in the rear of lots 499 to 551 inclusive, as dedicated to the use of the public in Dix-Eureka-Pennsylvania Subdivision being part of the east 1/4 of the northeast 1/4 of Section 26, Town 3 South Range 10 East, Ecorse Township, Wayne County, Michigan, and recorded in Liber 34 of Plats, Page 33, Wayne County Records, being in all 1.027 miles of subdivision streets and 1.703 miles of alleys, be it resolved that the same are hereby abandoned and discontinued as public highways.


