



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Ice Storm Halts Traffic Here Wed. Morning

Buses, Cars and Trucks Are Stalled on Hills And Viaducts. Schedules Canceled About 7 A. M.

A moderate rainstorm Tuesday which attracted notice at first only because of its unseasonableness, transformed the heretofore clear roads for the first time this winter into the worst traffic hazards experienced here in years. Last winter with its heavy snows and alternate thawing and freezing produced nothing quite as definitely dangerous as the roads in and around Northville were Tuesday night and Wednesday morning. By Wednesday night the rainfall, which had with the changing of temperatures on Tuesday night, turned the streets and roads to sheets of absolutely smooth ice, had melted and driving and walking were once more possible. A light snowfall Wednesday night covered the frozen streets and gave some traction Thursday morning although cautious traffic was still the order of the day.

No accidents were reported in the Village itself. Many drivers either left their cars at home or having ventured out, parked them on a bank or two of dirt and ice and did not return.

At the Northville High School a number of students were reported to have been injured. The school bus was stalled on the road and the students were taken to the hospital.

NORMAN NITZEL REPORTED WOUNDED AGAIN



 Lansing. A constitutional and by-laws are being drafted, and presiding as godfather over non-state officials will be State Treasurer Drake. This fact, being unusual, merits an explanation.
 Whenever a state official bands together the key men of influential interests, politicians sniff the air suspiciously and newspapermen sharpen their pencils.
 The power of township supervisors has been utilized for years by Mel McPherson, former chairman of the state tax commission. His affiliation with the supervisors was recognized generally as a political asset that served to bulwark a long and successful career in the public taxation field.
 It is reasonable that the state treasurer's zeal in behalf of local governments, which he sincerely believes to be superior to either state or federal public administration, should be interpreted by others in various ways. Is Drake trying to build a "political machine"? Is he looking ahead to the governorship? Here is the story as he relates it.
 "For years I have believed that long distance control in government is always, expense control, and today I am more convinced of this fact the more," he said. "County governments, as I have known them in upstate Michigan are more efficient than state government, and they certainly are for more effective than our federal government.
 "State government, for example is just too big to be as efficient. It is too far away from the people back home. Graft and waste of public funds may exist in a state government for a long time before they are uncovered by a grand jury investigation. Back home, practices of this kind do not survive very long.
 "I should explain that my observations of local government are in of, for the most part, on county government in Michigan. I have limited knowledge about Wayne County (Detroit).

BOARD HOURS—The Plymouth Rationing Board No. 33-82-19 is open six days a week from 8:30 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., except Wednesday afternoon, when office is closed to the public in order to keep up on clerical work. Thursday night office is open until 8:30 p.m. People in Oakland County may contact their board at branch offices in South Lyon, Farmington and Walled Lake or at the main office in Pontiac.
O. P. A. Community Service office in Northville Villages Hall Tuesdays 8:30 to 1 p.m. and Friday 12 noon to 4 p.m.
GAS RENEWALS—Renewal requests for "B" or "C" gasoline coupons may be made by mail. Blankets may be obtained at the Record office. Fill in the application (making it consistent with your original application) tie your tire inspection sheet to the application you.
PROCESSED FOODS—Green stamps D, E and F in Book Four are good through January 28.
MEATS, FATS—Brown stamps R and S are good through Feb. 25. Brown stamp T becomes good January 3.
SUGAR—Sugar rations for home use will remain the same for another two and a half months, according to the Office of Price Administration. Sugar Stamp No. 30 in war ration book four becomes valid on January 16 and will be good for five pounds of sugar through the end of March.
SHOES—Stamp 18 in Book 1 and No. 1 airplane stamp in Book 3 good for 1 pair each until further notice.
GASOLINE—Stamps A-9 good for 3 gallons through January 21, 1944. B-2, C-1 and C-2 stamps good for 2 gallons until used. B-2 and C-2 good for 5 gallons. Stamps and license numbers must be written on face of each coupon. IMMEDIATELY upon receipt of book.
TIRES—Next inspections due: A book vehicles by March 31; B 6 months or every 5,000 miles, whichever is first.
FUEL OIL—Period 2 coupons good through Feb. 7; Period 3 coupons through March 13. All have value of 10 gallons for each unit.
STOVES—Certificates to purchase most heating and cooking stoves that burn coal, wood, oil or gas must now be obtained from local board.

 Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Hamilton of Detroit were guests of the defense of local governments against "unjust" criticism and attack as well as united opposition to the "unnecessary" removal of any local government function to state and national level. The qualifying words, you will note, are "unjust" and "unnecessary."
 Formation of the clearing house (lobby) will probably tag it a lobbyist is further proof of a current trend accelerated by war regimentation, to decentralize public administration. Washington has discovered it is becoming top heavy with bureaus and red tape. Many offices have been transferred elsewhere.
 Now a Michigan state official, custodian of many millions of public funds, advocates openly the defense of home rule as a protection against further encroachment of centralized state government and as the paying best insurance for economy.
 If the institute becomes solely a defensive organ to react to new and to perpetuate the old, it will become an overnight target of reformers who regard local government machinery as "obsolete" and who place upon it the old-fashioned tag of "bureaucratic."
 State Treasurer Drake, six years chairman of the Senate judiciary committee, is not swayed by the moderate pleas of the politicians, science professors. He agrees that charges should be laid for the most part what we already have and seek to improve the quality of office-holders rather than "crash machinery" itself and adopt a substitute.
 This attitude is predicated on a belief, as we analyze it, that good government depends more upon the ability and honesty of office-holders than upon the form of government itself. Thus, a county commission form would probably bring no substantial improvement over the present system of county board of supervisors unless members of the commission, as chosen by the people at the ballot box, were men of MORE ability, more industry and more integrity. It's the man, not the office, that makes government good or bad.
 And back of the man in public office is the man... you start... who get pretty much what we deserve through our sponsorship of good candidates for public offices and then through our support of these candidates at the polls. When we fail in our responsibilities of the grass roots of democracy, the chickens of bad government come home to roost right on our front steps. That's where they belong. The only trouble is that in the case of state and federal governments, the chickens have to go farther to get there; sometimes it takes a grand jury to make them move.

FARM SAUSAGE RECIPE

An average recipe for seasoning 100 pounds of sausage trimmings suggests the following: 28 ounces of salt; 2 to 4 ounces of rubbed sage; 2 to 4 ounces of black pepper; and if desired, one ounce of ground cloves or nutmeg or one-half to one ounce of red pepper.

An experimental four pounds can be seasoned by using four level teaspoons of salt, four level teaspoons of rubbed sage, two of black pepper and, if desired, one level teaspoon of cloves or nutmeg or a half teaspoon of red pepper. By sampling this small quantity, the family can decide if the sausage needs more or less of any of the ingredients.



Changes in Stove Rationing Eligibility requirements for rationed stoves have been widened. A consumer who has a heating or cooking stove that cannot be used satisfactorily is now eligible for a stove-rationing certificate. Ration certificates also may be issued for stoves to heat premises where essential community activities, such as volunteer Red Cross work are carried on. A ration certificate may now be issued to a landlord who wishes to let a stove for the use of an eligible tenant.
