No. 3 "Smith" signs have been paid yearly on this debt until October 1, 1943, when a final campaign by the men of the church was launched to wipe out the debt and raise an amount for the needed renovation.

Bishop Raymond J. Wade will give a personal address Sunday evening. The church expects the community to help celebrate this event.





Quota of \$50,000 Required to Have Plane Bear Label of Northville School

If the school children of the Northville Schools can make their quota of \$50,000 and qualify for the new Mustang Plane, Northville and surrounding towns will have met its quota on the 4th War Loan Drive. Just as through the cooperation of local committees and the schools every effort is being made to raise the necessary \$130,000 needed to make the attainment of the dual goal of the community units and the allocation of the school to qualify for the honor of having a P-51 Mustang Pursuit plane named and used. The idea is being purchased through boxes sold by the pupils of the Northville school.

Throughout the village and among the women and the girls, have been doing a most useful job in selling bonds and everyone seems to be doing their part. All the job needs now is the extra push of the last ten thousand dollars to meet the ambition of the school children come true and have the Mustang Plane bear the Northville label. The drive closes Tuesday, Feb. 15, and Northville can more than reach its quota if all do their share.

Present School Minute Man Flag

90% of Pupils and Faculty of Northville Schools Have Regularly Purchased War Bonds and Stamps

At about an early date the high school and grade school to be held today, Feb. 15, at 11 a.m. in the high school gym, the Northville schools will be presented with a Minute Man Flag in recognition of the record these schools have made in buying bonds. This flag signifies that 90 per cent of the students and faculty are regular weekly purchasers of stamps or bonds. Supt. Amerman has announced that a representative of the Treasury Department will make the presentation.

This Tuesday assembly of all the students of the Northville schools will climax the bond sale drive that has been going forward with such enthusiasm these past few weeks. If the \$50,000 quota of the schools is subscribed the schools will have the honor of having a Mustang P-51 named for the school.

Tuesday morning there will be also the presentation of the prizes offered by S. L. Brauer and Austin Van Howe to students making the biggest sale records. There are eight prizes offered, four for the high school and four for the grade school.

Weather permitting the assembly will be held out doors, in which case friends and parents are invited to attend this patriotic bond rally. If the meeting must be held in doors parents and friends are still welcome to attend although the space will be limited.




