**A TWENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO**  
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next objective. And then, when the war was won on all fronts, the Allied Nations would police the world during the armistice or "cooling off" period, prior to the treaty, and then during the peace itself."

**One Year Later - May 1943**  
May 14, 1943: Lieut. General Erehon B. Somervell, chief of the army services of supply, visited Michigan last summer. Recently he declared that the U.S. Army will not be completely equipped until late in 1944. Only in the field of ammunition is there a reserve. Rumors of over-production were called the work of fifth-columnists.

**War to Continue 18-24 Months**  
June 18, 1942, we deplored the prevalent attitude of over-optimism and ventured the following interpretation: "According to all facts which can be assembled, we can reasonably anticipate that the war will continue for 18 to 24 months. Even if Germany collapses by 1943, a minimum of a year would be expected to transport troops and supplies to the Orient for a decisive showdown with the Japanese. The public is being deluded if it expects anything but a long, long war with great sacrifice. We should face the facts: The situation is very serious."

**18 Months Later - July 1943**  
July 23, 1943: "Instead of fighting one war and with France, Italy and Japan among our allies, we have two wars on our hands; our troops are yet to land on the continent of Europe; only four of our divisions saw action in Tunisia. . . . We still have a long way to go before the boys march into Berlin and Tokio."

**Can We Win the Peace**  
Sept. 24, 1943: As the casualty lists grow longer, splashing our silver stars with gold, what will we think and do? Will we return to nationalism and its renunciation of world responsibility for winning the peace?

**Germany Has 300 Divisions**  
Oct. 22, 1943: "Germany has 300 well-trained and well-equipped army divisions in Europe. Most of them are on the Italian front. The American army and navy at the end of 1942, fourteen months from today, will have about 77,000 men overseas and 3,750,000 still the Marine Wheeler's at

## BOMBER PLANT QUOTA PASS QUOTA EXPECTED BY ARMY

More than 3,000 four-engined B-24 Liberators have been built at the Willow Run Bomber Plant, it was announced last week by the Ford Motor Company. Of this total, 2,000 bombers were completed, five away from, and the remainder were knocked down for scrap.

Army officials said Saturday that 18 was the biggest day in the history of Willow Run from the standpoint of Army acceptance of planes.

Production officials expect Willow Run to far exceed its quota this month. The present quota, in number of aircraft, was the peak Army experts had previously expected from Willow Run.

## EGGS COME FIRST, MSC MEN DECIDE

The old question of which came first, the chicken or the egg, may get an answer in Michigan in 1945.

Unless consumers help remedy the egg market by using extra eggs in the next few days, poultrymen may become too discouraged to buy baby chicks for the flocks that will lay eggs this winter, according to an analysis made by C. G. Card of the Michigan State College poultry department and Ray Conolly, field manager for the Michigan State Poultry Improvement Association.

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In February, Michigan hens laid 168,000,000 eggs—an increase of 28 per cent over February, 1943, according to reports summarized by the federal state

crop statistician's office in Lansing. Egg prices in that month were 2½ cents a dozen, lower than a year ago although feed prices advanced 18 per cent for laying mash and 30 per cent for scratch grains in the 12-month period.

Homemakers will be helping themselves and the whole war effort by purchasing and using extra eggs in April, claims Professor Card. Wise poultrymen will remain in the business and purchase chicks early enough to

share in the high price period of October, November and December.


