The Record staff was greatly interested in the May issue of the "Yank Down Under" by the Men, for the Men in the Service. Our thanks to Sgt. Cummings, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. B. Cummings of West Grand River, just out of New Guinea.

Things are pretty busy over here, but regardless of all the excitement most of us who have spent two years here in the tropics are looking forward to coming home for a visit. Home certainly will look wonderful, a high spot in my homecoming will be my first taste of a good old hamburger, haven't had one since I left France. The Aussies tried to imitate them but the result was pretty bad, tasted like ground mutton.

I would appreciate hearing from some of you so please drop me a line. Like every soldier, I'll call it still the most important part of the army day to me.

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Northville Boy Reported Missing

1/Sgt. Fred J. Robinson, Radio and Camera Operator, Reported Missing to Return From Bombing Mission Over Hungary

Another notice of missing in action was received by Northville parents last week Friday. Mr. and Mrs. Frank Robinson of 1431 1/2 road were informed by the War Department that their son, Technical Sergeant Fred J. Robinson, had been missing since July 7, when he took part in a mission over Hungary. He was a radio team and gunner with a bombing group. Among other missions in which Fred had flown over enemy territory was one in which the oil wells of Rumania were bombed at low level. The news having come so soon after the date on which he failed to return to his base, the parents are firm in the belief that their son probably came down in the enemy's territory and was made a prisoner.

Fred graduated from Northville High school in 1940 and was captain of the school base ball team. Later he worked first in the Wolfe-Maki plant and then at the local Ford plant. He went into Service about a year ago, starting in a radio school in Chicago and working his way up to radio unit and gunner on one of the U. S. bombers. He is on furlough in the gray suit of last week. He was sent overseas in February, 1944, and in June Fred wrote his family here that he had received the Air Medal for Distinguished Service.

Please Have Papers Tied; Place at Curb

Pickup Will be Done by Legionnaires After Five O'Clock Each Evening

With arrangements completed and personnel assigned, local plans are now complete for the waste paper drive, Thursday and Friday, Aug. 3 and 4. This drive will cover the township and village.

The pickup will be made by teams of Legionnaires after five o'clock p.m.

In the township outside of the village people are asked to place their papers tied in bundles at the side of the road on 8, 7, 6 and 5 Mile roads, and trucks will traverse these roads from Haggerty to Napier to pick up the paper from township residents.

In the village everyone is asked to tie the papers and place them at the curb where the bundles may be easily seen and picked up by the teams of men covering that area. The same general scheme of pickup will be followed as has been used before.

The following general designations were made. North side of Main street pickup will be in charge of Merrill, Sweet and Oscar Hammond who will recruit help and vehicles for pickup on both evenings. On the south side of Main street Alton Peters and Floyd Lansing will secure vehicles and help for the pickup in that area. In the township west of town Luther Lapham will direct; they, too, will recruit help and vehicles for the two evening pickups. It was thought it was not necessary to make the pre-arrangements to house as before because most people would respond without extra reminding.

Elmer Houghton Dies in Veteran Hospital Monday

Elmer Houghton formerly of Northville, aged 23 years, died at Veterans' Administration hospital, Wood, Wisconsin, Monday, July 24.

Elmer was inducted into the Army from Board 61 on Aug. 17, 1942 and served until hospitalized in Camp McCoy Hospital, Wisconsin. He contracted pleurisy - pneumonia followed by tuberculosis. In May of 1943 he entered a Schick General Hospital at Clinton, Iowa. Later he was sent to Veterans' Administration hospital, where he received his honorable discharge; he has been a best patient there ever since.

An American Legion funeral was held Thursday at 2:30 p.m. with Rev. Mombé officiating in the Richardson - Bird Funeral Home at Milford. The L.O.O.F. No. 270 volunteered as pallbearers. Burial was made in Oakland Hills Memorial Park.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Houghton of Milford, a brother, Pfc. George Jr., serving in France; a sister, Mrs. Lynn Matthews, of Walled Lake, and a brother, Alvin of Detroit besides other out-of-town relatives.

The Houghton family formerly lived on a farm which they own on Napier road, near Grand River. They moved only a year ago to their present location in Milford.


