Just a few lines from this part of the globe, to thank you for the Record, which I receive here regular these days. It is worth its weight in gold, and is about the greatest little paper there is. It really brings us soldiers from the old home town a lot of enjoyment and comfort in our spare minutes. I'm sure that all the fellows will agree with me about it.

I'm still in good health, and getting along as fine as ever, and hope this letter will find all my old friends at home the same way and still enjoying the better things of life.

We are having great summer weather here in Italy, at the present time it is rather on the warm side, but then one has to look forward to those things at this time. The country is bonny and the dust is, beyond words, it's quite a problem to keep clean. The Army has shower units set up at different places for us, which we get to whenever possible, and you can bet we sure do take ad- vantage of them. The Army has gone to lots of added work to arrange things as near like home as possible, for the men overseas. In all there is very little that one can gripe about in any way.

There is very little that I can say in the line of news from here as it's considered Military Information, and we are not al- lowed to write about it in any way. We are having a very good luck at the turning out of our best to do a bang up job, and things seem to be possible for us to return to our families and friends again.

I was able to spend a day in Rome on pass, while we were in that area. The city of Rome is a wonderful place to visit, and its sight of old Roman ruins is one that a person enjoys seeing. I was able to visit St. Peter's Cathedral while in Rome, and it's the most wonderful sight I have ever seen. A person can't begin to realize how wonderful it is, until they see it for themselves. I know of no words in which I could ever begin to give you an idea of what it is like.

As time is short and I must be on my way again, I'll close wishing you and all my old friends and the best of luck to all.

Italy, July 22, 1944  
Well, what do you think of the war news? Hitler damn near got it the night before last. It's too bad the timing was a little off.

The Japanese have also thrown Tojo and his cabinet out and they think they will get better results now. Won't they be surprised soon though? It won't be long now.

Our B-24's from around here have been showing (well) out of Germany lately and a lot of them are from Willow Run so the people there are doing a good job. We have one Ford B-24 here that has completed 41 missions over Germany and German occupied countries. None of its crew has had a scratch but one time she came in with 93 flak holes in her. She is covered with patches and after nine more missions the crew will be able to go back to the states. I don't know if the plane will go back or not but I doubt if it.

Well Grandpa, I must close now as there isn't anything to write about. Tell everyone I'm O.K. again and back with my outfit.

Tell Mr. Cansfield that I don't get all the Records sent me but I sure appreciate the ones that get here. It is nice to hear about the old home town even if it isn't very often.

Write to me when you can as a letter is always welcome when we're returned out from the days run and everything is quiet for the night.

## Rodgers Awarded Purple Heart

Sgt. Clayton Rodgers Re- ceives Award Following Return From Assignment in Italy

Sgt. Clayton C. Rodgers writes to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Rodgers, of West Dunlap street, that he has been awarded the Purple Heart. In the letter Clayton said he is one of three men out of an eighteen- man Ranger outfit, who got back safely from an assignment in Italy.

Writing together two articles one from a March issue of the Stars and Stripes, Italian edition, and one from the Detroit Free Press, we get the story of the mission. Two battalions of Rangers set out on a supposedly routine assignment to "wait hell" in Cassano di Lorio, at 1 a. m. Jan. 30. Before noon of that day, most of them had been killed, wounded or taken pris- oner. Their orders were to in- filtrate behind the German lines and later to meet up with fore- front of co. Infantry. However, the Germans had moved their positions into that area, still fighting, and so all of the Rangers were ordered to make their way back. Clayton was one of the three men of his unit who finally returned. His unit was sent to the States and he was awarded the Purple Heart.

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
