I have been gone a long time and seem to have forgotten some of the old gang, but hope to see them all again.

My career in the Army really started out with a fast shuffle from Camp Roberts Calif. From there we had quite a reception. We were the first troops to land in part of Oklahoma and then in a certain Australian city and to Colorado. It is only an eight hour ride on the streamer.

The people were all curious to see and talk to a Yank. We from Denver to Chicago. They really got a big kick out of the drill field here is all grass. They Aussies slang. We found out as have a very nice baseball and one passed that some of our football field with lights on it so you can play at night. We are supposed to get a Class A pass. I am going to call up the army and see if I can get much space. I imagine that most people at home have heard all about Australia by this time. So I can get the Record my new address.

It's not quite a year from some articles in the Record. I remember one letter especially. It concerned some fellows who were in the European theater for almost a year and were wondering when they would get home.

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


