I guess I had better close for now but will be looking for some more copies of the Record soon.

The best of luck to my friends in the Service and the folks on the home front. I hope it isn't too long before I see them all again.

Prayer Bolsters Marine at Saipan

Official Dispatch Cites Local Marine for Memorized Prayer to Give Courage

Saipan, Marianas Islands—(Delayed)—A young Marine who wrote his own prayer to "carry him through the battle of Saipan" saw half of his company killed or wounded in the 25-day campaign, but remained unscathed himself. He believes the fact that he memorized the prayer and recited it before going into battle each time helped give him the courage that brought him through safely.

The Marine is Private First Class Charles A. Mankin, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Kroeber of 566 Carpenter street, Northville, Michigan.

The prayer, written in the form of a poem, was composed by Mankin and was aboard troop transport on the way to the Marianas. It reads as follows:

STAY WITH ME LORD
 Stay by me, Lord, the day is long
 The burdens heavy to bear
 Stay by me, Lord, the night is dark
 And heavy with battle the air
 Stay by me, Lord, if courage fails
 And fear should take its place
 With a natural fear of all unknown
 Heaven is still my goal
 So stay by me, Lord, if death should peer
 And I should falter there
 Stay by me, Lord, show me the way
 Into your lasting care
 The young Marine, who has made the writing of poetry a hobby during his Marine Corps career, also commemorated the death of eight buddies in a long poem written on captured Japanese rice paper shortly after the battle in which they were killed.

The poem also honors the courage of Private First Class Clarence H. Manzol, official of the 44th Central Postal Directory, who was killed in action at Saipan.

Private Mankin was awarded the Purple Heart for wounds that he received July 26.

Urge Boys and Girls To Return to School This Year

The attention of every parent and every child of school age is focused on the opening date of this year more than ever before. Every boy and girl of high school age should plan to return to their classes and complete their high school education. Temporary employment at high wages has tempted many young people to postpone or abandon the completion of their high school courses.

This condition is viewed with alarm by educators and others throughout the nation. Steps are being taken to encourage the youth of the country to return to their classes in September. Our own State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Dr. Eugene H. Elliott, has read out such an appeal to the young people of Michigan and the Northville board of education echoes this call.

Lack of a high school education is a serious immediate handicap to young people entering the armed services and will prove to be even more embarrassing in civilian life after the war. Our country can well use all the trained minds and hands available when the conflict is ended.

The Northville High School facilities are ready and available to serve the youth of this area. Some may find it necessary to come part-time or to attend correspondence courses through the local school. Others may have personal problems and plans that should be discussed with the school.

Both Mr. Argerman and Mr. Harrison are available at any time to lend assistance to any parent or student who would like to work out plans. Inquiries will be welcomed and we urge you to enroll.

Northville public schools will open for the 1944-45 term Wednesday, Sept. 6. Supt. R. H. Argerman announced that registration for kindergarten and grade school children will be done on the first day of school, Sept. 6.

Allocations brought the amount up, making it possible to again reach the quota. Northville did \$346,937.00 worth of bonds in the 5th War Loan. It is impossible to thank the individuals who bought and sold, and helped in so many ways, but we can each have a bit of community pride in a job well done. There are 54 women who are mainly responsible for this success, and the churches and organizations in town can be proud to have such women as these on their membership rolls. One outstanding example is Mrs. W. A. Parmenter, a 51 year old grandmother with a son and two grandchildren in the service. Wixom Co-op Has A Banner Year

Cooperative Society at Wixom Shows Large Volume of Business at Close of Fiscal Year

The Wixom Cooperative Company closed its fiscal year, June 30, 1944 with net sales of \$596,322.64, an increase of \$197,759.91 or 33.15% over the year ending June 30, 1943.

The Wixom elevator showed merchandise sales of \$273,752.28 and services of \$3,595.40. South Lyon elevator merchandise sales of \$22,039.07 and services of \$2,031.93. Garage sales were \$29,119.95 and services of \$3,429.75, and tank register sales of \$38,506.53.

Current assets are \$91,613.25, and fixed assets of \$31,648.30, other asset: \$9,611.49 or a total of \$132,873.04. After paying the fixed dividend on preferred stocks there will be left \$1,000.00 which will be paid in revolving preferred stock to some 4,000 customers.

There are now approximately 700 voting members of the company. The annual meeting will be held at the Wixom Community Hall, Monday evening, Aug. 28, 1944.
