Liberty was looked forward to by everyone because of the places to go. I had four full days of liberty while I was there and took in just about every place of interest on the island. I think I'll still take the napoleonic back home to the coconut palm out here and the aren't intriguing enough to make me stay either.

I think that Miss Ludwig, my biology teacher at N.H.S., would really be in her glory out here because just about everything in the book can be had for just getting your feet wet. Hello Gladys.

Local Residents Reminded That Overseas Packages Must Go Out Soon

Local residents who intend to send a Christmas package to a service man or woman overseas are again reminded by the post office at Northville that all packages must be mailed by Sept. 15, 1944, and Oct. 15, 1944.

All Christmas packages carried in Army Post Office, or Fleet Post Office, must be mailed during the period. Each package must weigh over five pounds and should not be more than 36 inches in length and 18 inches in width. No more than one package a week may be mailed to the same service man.




