

Fire Prevention Week Asks for Annual Check Here

Club Opens 52nd Season Friday

With annual Fire Prevention Week near at hand, and the winter season just around the corner, there's no better time now to check up on fire hazards around the farm, and home. County Agricultural Agent E. J. Basemer states that defective chimneys and flues rank first among causes of farm fires, so an examination of those around your home may prevent another fire hazard and dangerous property loss.

First, see that the chimney is clean and that no cracks have developed in or between the bricks. See that there is a tight connection between the smoke pipe and the chimney, and that the pieces are firmly anchored to human life around the farm and home. Here are a few tips for electrical users:

Don't overload the wiring.

Don't use more than one piece of portable equipment on one outlet.

Don't use metal sockets in arm wiring—use porcelain or other approved non-metallic ones.

Don't use pull chain switches unless they contain an insulating link or cord.

Don't overload your motors.

Don't let the braid or insulation on wires get frayed—make repairs or replace cords at the first sign of danger.

Don't hang extension cords over nails or other metal objects.

Don't tamper with permanent wiring unless you first cut off possession last Monday. The current at the fuse box or new lunch room will be known master switch.



County Tax Rate Lower This Year

The average 1944-1945 County tax rate to be levied against that part of Wayne County outside the City of Detroit will be approximately \$4.833 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation, or \$294 per thousand less than the \$5.128 per thousand levied in the 1943-1944 fiscal year.

The Board of County Auditors pleased to announce that this lower tax rate is possible in spite of the fact that the following major appropriation increases have been added to the 1944-1945 budget:

(1) \$802,278.00 to the Wayne County Employees' Retirement System.

(2) \$625,000.00 to provide a \$150.00 per annum cost-of-living increase to approximately 4,150 employees receiving less than \$5,600.00 per annum.


(3) \$250,000.00 recommended as a Postwar Emergency Appropriation.

(4) \$217,731.25 representing the increased appropriation required by the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority representing a three-sixteenths of a mill levy.

The above-mentioned decrease in the 1944-1945 County tax rate is possible first because it is estimated that as of November 30, 1944, and resultant upon sound budgeting and careful budget control, there will be an unencumbered cash balance of \$1,500,000.00 available to reduce the amount necessary to be levied as taxes for the fiscal year beginning December 1, 1944, and second, because it is estimated that in the 1944-1945 fiscal year the reimbursements from the State of Michigan for

The budget estimates for the forthcoming fiscal year upon which the 1944-1945 tax rate is based have been most carefully computed, and in the opinion of the Board of County Auditors constitute the minimum provision essential to the efficient maintenance of adequate services to the public.

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
