

Thanksgiving Day Proclamation By The President

In this year of liberation, which has seen so many millions freed from tyrannical rule, it is fitting that we give thanks with special fervor to our heavenly Father for the mercies we have received individually and as a nation and for the blessings He has restored, through the victories of our arms and those of our allies, to His children in other lands.

For the preservation of our way of life from the threat of destruction, for the unity of spirit which has kept our nation strong; for our abiding faith, freedom, and for the promise of an enduring peace we should lift up our hearts in thanks giving.

For the harvest that has sustained us and, in its fullness, brought succor to other peoples; for the bounty of our soil, which has produced the sineses of war for the protection of our liberties and for a multitude of private blessings, known only in our hearts, we should give united thanks to God.

To the end that we may bear more earnest witness to our gratitude to Almighty God, I suggest a nationwide reading of the Holy Scriptures during the period from Thanksgiving Day to Christmas. Let every man of every creed go to his own version of the Scriptures for a renewed and strengthening contact with those eternal truths and majestic principles which have inspired such measure of true greatness as this nation has achieved.

Now, therefore, I, Franklin D. Roosevelt, President of the United States of America, in consonance with the joint resolution of the Congress approved Dec. 28, 1941, do hereby proclaim Thursday the 23rd day of November, 1944, a day of national thanksgiving; and I call upon the people of the United States to observe it by bending every effort to hasten the day of final victory and by offering to God our devout gratitude for His goodness to us, and to our fellow men.

Processed Foods

Blue stamps A8 through 28 and A5 through W5, good indefinitely. No new stamp until Dec. 1.

Sugar stamps 30, 31, 32 and 33, each good for five months indefinitely. Sugar stamp 34 becomes good November 16 and remains good indefinitely. Sugar stamp 40, good for five pounds of canned sugar through February 28, 1945.

Gasoline

In 17 East Coast states A-11 coupons, good through Oct. 3 in states outside the East Coast area, A-13 coupons, good for 4 gallons through Dec. 21.

Gas

Period 4 and 5 coupons and new period 1, 2, 3 coupons, good throughout present heating year.

Shoes

Airplane stamps 1, 2, and 3 in book three, good indefinitely.

Meals, Feb.

Red stamps 18 through 28 and A5 through P5, good indefinitely. The four red stamps valid October 29 totaling 40 red points will have to last for at least a 5-week period. No new red stamps until December 3rd.

Michigan residents constitute the bulk of the student body with 3,205 enrolled. New York leading the out-of-state enrollees with 122. County leaders are Wayne, with 746; Ingham with 601; and Oakland with 300.

Including 227 foreign students total enrollment represents 79 Michigan counties, 38 states and 10 foreign countries.
