Molded Cranberry Salad
2 cups cranberries 1/4 cup chopped celery
1 cup boiling water 1/4 cup red apple, chopped
1 cup sugar 2 tbsp. chopped pecans
1 1/4 tbsps. granulated gelatin soaked in 1/4 cup cold water
Mayonnaise

Cook cranberries in water 10 minutes. Force through strainer, add soaked gelatin and stir until dissolved, then add sugar. Fold in apple, nuts and celery after mixture begins to thicken. Pour in mold and chill. Serve on lettuce, plain or with mayonnaise.

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

"In E. R. C. there was a grouping of three planets—Jupiter, Saturn and Mars—which might have provided the ancients with their long-awaited sign of the Nativity."


"One year earlier—7 B. C.—similarly grouped."







Singing of Bob's Head

One of Old Yule Customs

Of the customs that grew up around the Christmas festival in Merrie England, the serving of the boar's head was one of the most stirring. It continues to this day at Queen's College, Oxford, where the 50-pound boar's head—a boar in its grimacing jaws—is borne in on a great silver dish, escorted by trumpeters and candle-bearers. It is served up with a woodious flourish of music and merriment at the high table where St. George dines.

In the older days there was an appropriate chant-halt card and half ritual that the gentlemen used to bellow at the moment the dish troubled the board:

The Boar's Head
The fox to the vineyard,
Let Bacchus crown his fell.
Let this boar's head and mustard
Stand for pigs, porcine and custard,
And so ye are welcome all.

God Rest Ye
God rest ye merry, gentlemen,
Let nothing you dismay,
For Jesus Christ our Savior
Was born upon this day.

For a Merry Christmas
To save us all from Satan's power
When we were gone astray,
O tidings of comfort and joy
For Jesus Christ our Savior
Was born on Christmas day.
